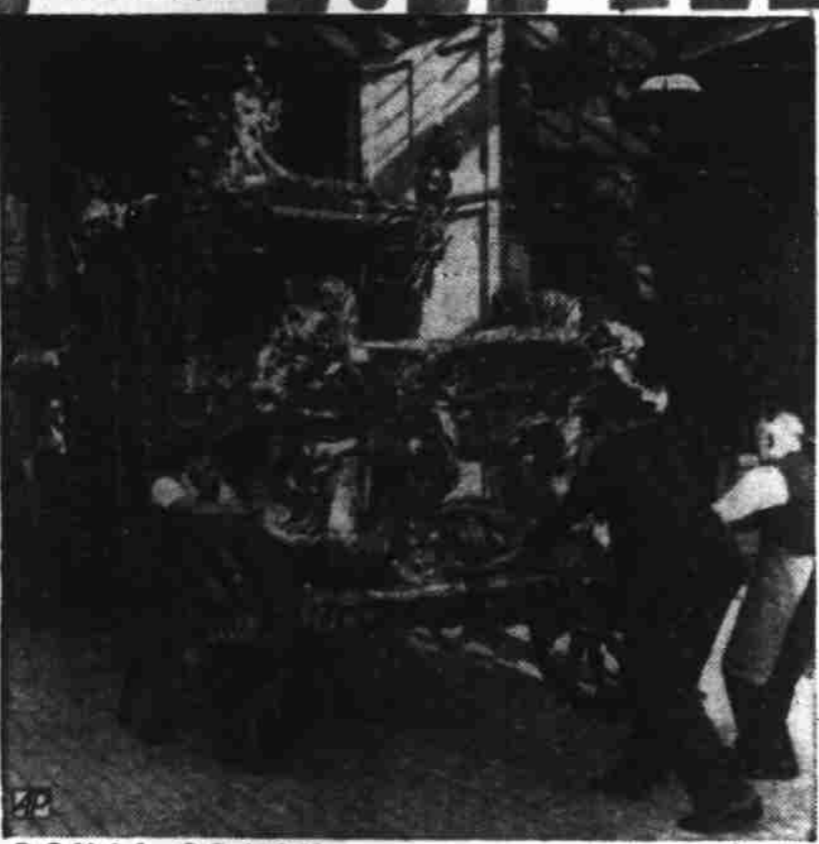
Astoria Woman Visits Halls Ferry Family
