

New Church Building Refused By City Council; Street and Sewer Improvements Approved

Permission to build a church at North Capitol and Hood streets was refused by the Salem city council Monday night, after aldermen heard two additional protests to the proposed Gospel tabernacle there. The resolution which would have authorized the church construction under new city procedure for effecting such permission without property owner petitions was defeated by a voice vote. The Rev. Max Wyatt, present to reiterate his request for resolution passage deferred from last month when a hearing was held, asserted the church plan was misrepresented in a remonstrance petition circulated since the hearing.

The remonstrance by 33 residents of that area expressing five objections: That a traffic hazard would result, that the pastor probably would not remain in Salem after construction to carry out any promises he may have made the council, that lumber on the lot appeared old and charred and indicated the building would be flimsy, that one church already is in the vicinity and another has permission to build nearby and

that the church might hold noisy and night services.

Traffic Held Excessive
A letter from F. B. Crandall, traffic engineer for the state highway department, stated Capitol street (US 99-E) is presently carrying a volume of traffic in excess of its practical capacity which, coupled with a large volume of cross traffic, both vehicular and pedestrian, is creating one of our most acute problems in Salem.

Crandall's letter expressed the opinion that additional churches near that section of the Pacific highway would aggravate the traffic problems and should be discouraged. "The basic remedy lies in proper planning and zoning," the letter concluded.

Eleven ordinance bills became law, under suspended rules, to assess property owners for street paving projects which will be carried out as a result of earlier petitions for the improvements, which include:

Wilbur street from Church to Cottage streets, John street from Superior street 150 feet south; Claude street from Ford to 23rd and from 23rd to 25th streets; Garfield street from 18th street to Garfield's east end; Grant street from 18th to 19th streets; Shipping from 5th to Church streets; Hood street from Front to 4th streets; Superior from Commercial to High streets; Jefferson from Commercial to 5th streets and an alley near Marion and Commercial streets.

Improvements on List
New petitions accepted and placed on the list for future street improvement affect Pine street from 5th to Church streets and Norway from 5th to Cottage streets. A petition for improvement of Adams from South 24th to 25th streets was turned down upon the city engineer's statement that less than the required 65 per cent of property was represented by petition signers.

The council accepted improvement petitions by Salem property owners for sanitary sewers from South 19th to 22nd streets along Oxford street, for a 200-foot stretch along 25th street north from State street and for a block near Grove street along Broadway street.

Resolutions were adopted for sidewalks on the south side of Breyman street for a 39-foot stretch between 20th and 21st streets and on both north and south sides of Cross street between Berry and 12th streets. A sidewalk line alteration was granted

residents on the south side of Hickory between Maple and 5th streets.

Setback Waivers Okeed
C. G. Layton was granted permission to locate a house on the property line at the foot of Oak street near the Willamette slough. Another setback line waiver was granted, provided nearby residents sign their consent, to James A. Anderson for a private garage about three feet from the sidewalk at 2060 S. Winter st.

An ordinance bill was introduced to accept from Mr. and Mrs. J. Lester DeLapp the deed to property which the city recently bought from them at \$850 for an extension of Myrtle street one block north to Locust street.

Another bill was presented for authorizing Bancroft improvement bonds amounting to \$44,127 for this year's street improvements which are being paid by property owners.

A resolution was adopted to authorize house-moving firms such as Henkle & Son, Kay Simmons and others to move residences from the two-block area north and east of Capitol and Center streets where 27 houses are in the process of being torn down or moved to make way for a \$2,000,000 retail trading center development. Also permitted was the moving of a small house from box 893, Salem route 3, to the 400 block of Lincoln street, for Jesse Juarez.

Gatch Speaks At VFW Post 661 Meeting

Vice-Adm. Thomas L. Gatch, USN retired, former Salem resident and of both world wars, was featured speaker at a meeting of Marion post 661, Veterans of Foreign Wars, at the VFW hall Monday night in observance of navy day.

Other guests at the meeting were Dave Hoss, chairman of the Salem Navy day committee, and Vernon Gilmore, commander of the local naval reserve and Gatch's aide during the navy day celebration.

Following Gatch's talk, members of the post voted to request Salem merchants to close during the Armistice day parade, since the merchants have voted to not close all day for the celebration. Veterans' insurance problems were discussed and Commander Cliff Maison announced he would arrange a speaker from the veterans administration to address the post in the near future to answer insurance problems.

Organization of the Salem Y's Men's club was completed in a meeting at the YMCA Monday night with election of officers and listing of charter members.

Elected to the board of directors for two-year terms were Coburn Grabenhorst, Carl Greider and Robert O. Smith. Ronald Hudkins, Everett Clark and Leon Margosian were elected to the board for one-year terms.

Charter members besides the officers are Robert Ewing, Harry Manning, Dale Bates, Nelson Hickok, James Tryon, Cecil Quesseth, Dr. W. C. Needham and Gus Moore, who is also adviser of the group.

The Salem club will receive its charter at a special meeting November 25, James Lee Ellenwood, New York, member of the YMCA national council who is on a tour of the United States, will be featured speaker for the occasion. Ellenwood will address other local organizations on November 26. The club will hold dinner meetings on the first and third Mondays of each month in the Y at 6:30 p. m.

LEBANON, Oct. 27 — Double funeral services will be held here at 2 p. m. Wednesday for Mr. and Mrs. Franklin Cruson of Lebanon who were killed early Sunday morning in an accident near Cascadia on the South Santiam highway. Services will be in Howe-Huston mortuary.

Franklin Cruson was 60 years old and a native of Lebanon. Mrs. Cruson is believed to have been about the same age as her husband. They had been residing at Mountain House, a store and restaurant which they sold recently. Cruson is survived by a son, Franklin Cruson, Jr., and a daughter, Mrs. Dagman of Corvallis, and a brother Claude.

Funeral services for Czerwie Crandall, 42, will be held at 2 p. m. Thursday at Howe-Huston mortuary. Crandall had been a member of the Lebanon postoffice staff for 23 years.

Survivors are a brother, George in Lebanon; a brother Claude, and a sister, Mrs. Muriel Larson in Salem; a niece and two nephews. The Crusons and Crandall were returning from a Saturday night community gathering. The accident happened about 2:15 Sunday morning, officers said.

Street Naming Changes in Bill

Legislation to change the names of 13 streets in Salem proper was introduced as an ordinance bill Monday night before the Salem city council, following a recommendation by the city planning and zoning commission last month that duplicated and near-duplicated street names be eliminated in Salem and its postal and utility area including West Salem.

The ordinance bill was given preliminary reading only, without discussion, and two resolutions were calling attention to name change recommendations on streets outside city limits, one addressed to Marion county court and the other to the West Salem city council, were tabled pending disposition of the city ordinance November 10.

Several of the suggested changes have brought expressions of opposition from residents who would be affected.

The pending city ordinance bill lists the following changes: Entire length of Hickory street to be changed to Broadway street.

Entire length of Fairgrounds road changed to Portland road.

Change West Nob Hill street to Liberty street (Salem Heights area).

Change East Nob Hill street to Nob Hill street (same area).

Change Evergreen avenue between Silverton road and the north line of Garden Fruit tracts to Duncan avenue.

Change Terrace avenue in Ben Lomond adjacent addition (between High and Summer streets). (New name not yet suggested.)

Change Oregon avenue (between Church and Cottage streets and south from Mill street) to Andrusen way.

Change Grogan street in MacDonaldd's Fruit tracts and Grogan addition to Hickory street.

Change Incinerator road to 25th street (in south Salem).

Change 22nd street in Lone Oak village (off Market street) to 23rd street.

Change 23rd street in same area to 24th street.

Change Prospect lane to North Commercial street (north of Locust street).

Eliminate Peck street name, as street occupied by Shilton ditch.
