

Appointment of Attorney Will Await Request

Appointment of a new attorney for the state liquor control commission, under added authority given his department by the 1947 legislature will not be made by Attorney General George Neuner until there is a vacancy and the commission has requested him to do so, he declared Monday.

Under the new 1947 law the attorney general's office became the "Oregon Department of Justice" with new duties including the appointment of attorneys for all state departments, boards and commissions.

Neuner said the liquor control commission still is operating under the old arrangement under which it has appointed its own attorneys.

Reports have been current here that Wilber Henderson, attorney for the present liquor commission,

would resign when its members step out. Members of the current liquor control commission recently submitted their resignations to Gov. John Hall but agreed to function until their successors have been appointed probably about December 1.

Some Anti-Freezes Called 'Damaging'

Complaints relative to damage to motor vehicles from the use of some of the anti-freeze preparations being offered on the market are justified, J. D. Patterson, chief chemist for the state department of agriculture, declared here Monday.

Patterson analyzed one type of anti-freeze, sold at a high price, which, he said, contained corrosive chemicals.

Patterson said chemicals of this type cause considerable damage to automobile engines. He suggested that persons purchasing anti-freeze solutions do so from reputable dealers.

Crowd Enjoys WU Symphony Concert Here

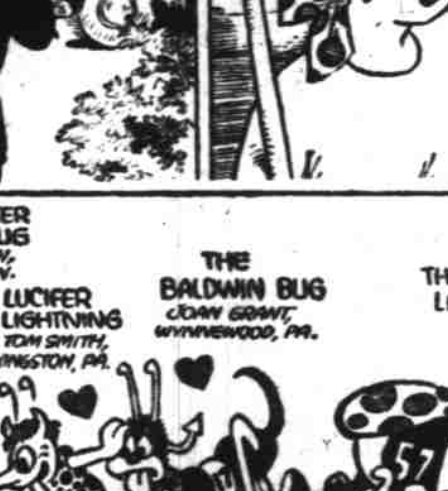
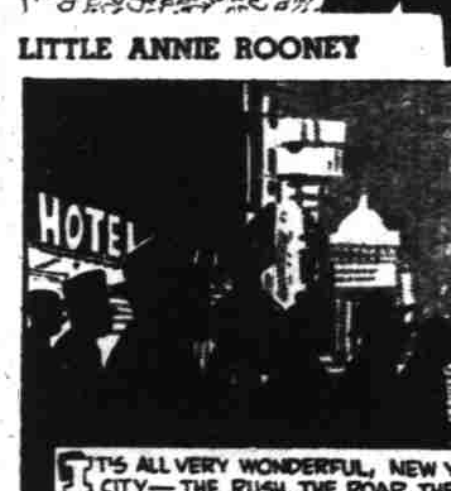
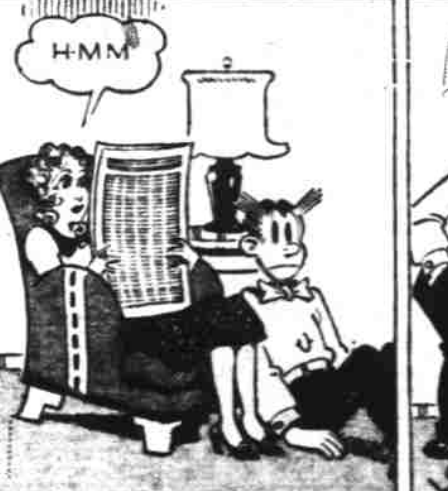

The local units of the ORC which Captain Reynolds will instruct are the 364th engineer boat and shore regiment, 409th headquarters company special brigade, and Third battalion, 415th infantry, all components of the 104th division.
