Construction of a church building for the Gospel Tabernacle, thwarted at Capitol and Hood streets by zoning restrictions despite an appeal to the city council, was authorized Friday for a site at 1325 N. 5th st. A city building permit estimating cost at \$20,000 was issued to the Rev. Max Wyatt.

CHICAGO, Nov. 14 (AP)—Rain nearly washed away three dollar wheat on the board of trade. The southwest received needed moisture and all grains responded by dropping the new crop wheat contract losing the most.

December wheat finished on a split quotation at \$2.99 3/4-3.00 after being down to \$2.99. That compared with a high of \$3.03 1/2, yesterday. Wheat lost 2 1/4-4 1/4%. Corn was 1 1/2-2% down, December \$2.35 1/2-2.34 1/2, and oats 1 cent lower to 1/2 higher, December \$1.15 1/2-1.16.
