

Grains Carry Steady Tone

CHICAGO, Nov. 19 (AP)—Feed grains carried a steady tone in board of trade dealings today, but wheat was inclined to be nervous and followed an irregular trend.

Oats advanced with corn and at the close wheat was 1 1/4 lower to 2 cents higher, December \$3.02-3.01 1/4. Corn was 1/4 lower to 1 1/2 higher, December \$2.44 1/2-3/4. Oats were 1/2 to 3/4 higher, December \$1.20 1/2-3/4.

Traders said the possibility of Washington developments continued to be the disturbing factor in wheat trade.

Yesterday's purchase of wheat by the commodity credit corporation was light.

Foreign advances said that France in asking for an additional 250,000 bushels of wheat and traders had reports that the production and marketing administration has withdrawn from the flour market after purchase of

more than 2,000,000 hundred-weight of flour during the past week.

Stocks Edge to Higher Ground

NEW YORK, Nov. 19 (AP)—Stocks edged forward on a selective basis in today's market, achieving gains of fractions to more than a point in the most active dealings in two weeks.

Completing its fifth successive session without a setback, the list advanced minus the aid of several so-called pivotal issues which either retreated or held to previous levels.

The Associated Press 60-stock composite was up .1 of a point at 65.1, of 1,033 issues registering, there were 527 gainers and 200 losers. Total transactions of 1,400,000 shares compared with 930,000 Tuesday.

Disposition to extend the recovery move was evident from the start. In contrast to recent performances, a new batch of dividend declarations produced fair response. Skepticism over business prospects remained to some extent, and tax selling placed an added drag on some stocks.

2 Valley Liquor Permits Revoked

PORTLAND, Nov. 19 (AP)—Licenses were suspended and revoked today by the Oregon liquor control commission on violations charged in the last session here.

Revocations included the restaurant and service license of the Tumble Inn, near Albany, for failure to maintain adequate meal service. Suspensions included a 30-day order on the Sheridan hall, operated by Arvid and Irene Ekman, Sheridan, for sale to minors.
