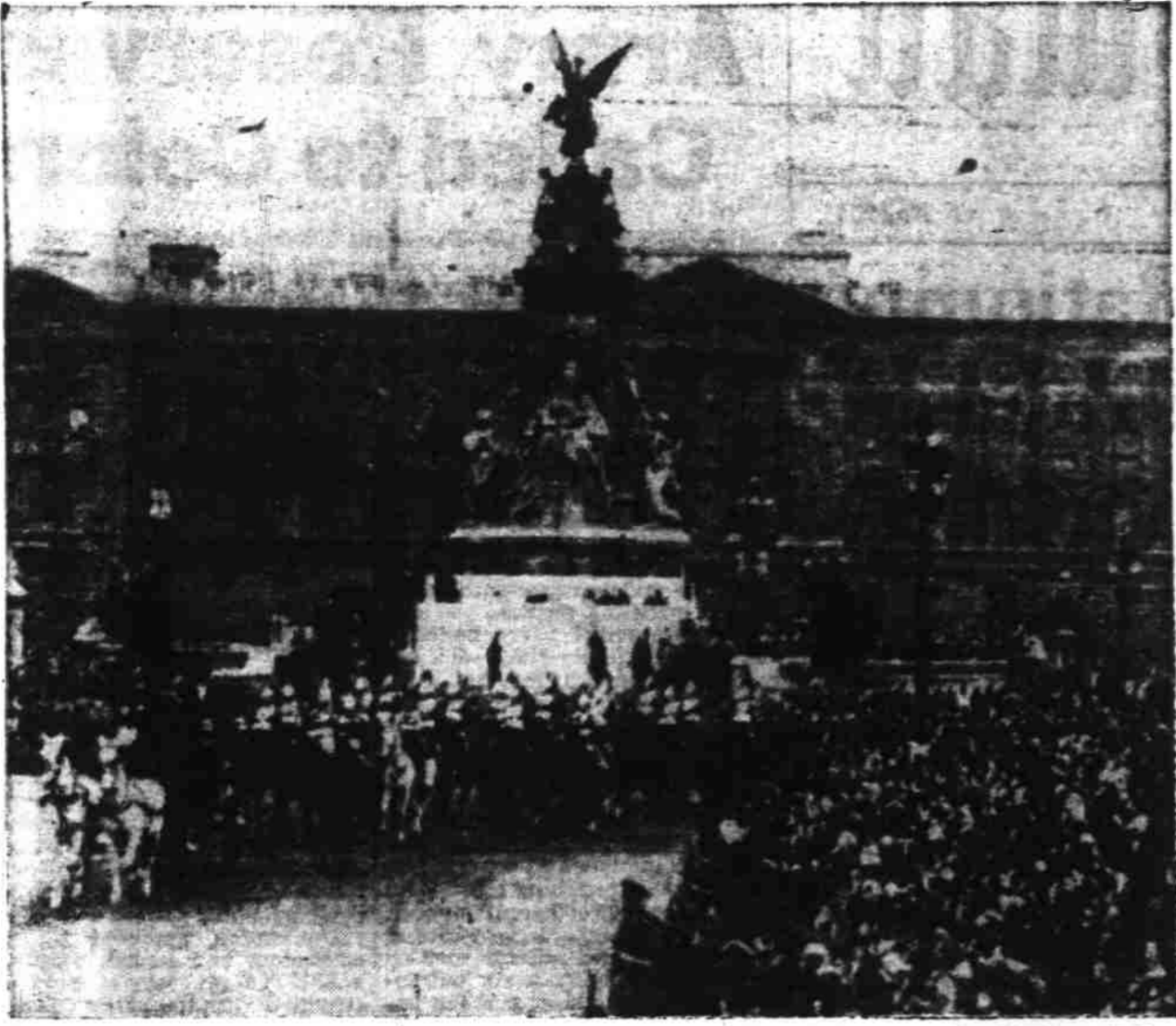


Bridal Procession Leaves Palace

Marion County Teachers Elect Mrs. Weddle

Carmalite I. Weddle of Salem was elected president of the Marion county teachers association at the association's dinner meeting Thursday night in the Marion hotel. She will take office in May succeeding Carl E. Aschenbrenner. Other officers elected include Margaret Sims, Salem, vice president; Bernice Gwynn, West Salem, secretary; Glen Waggoner, Stayton, treasurer; M. H. Beal, Jefferson; Lorraine Mausey, Salem; and Ralph Nelson, Keizer, were elected to the advisory committee.

Delegates to the state teachers' convention are to be Muriel Bentson, Salem, and Robert Miller, Silvertown. The group voted in favor of Martha Shull of Portland for the vice presidency of the state educational association. Joy Hill of Salem was nominated to represent Marion county on the ballot for a delegate from Oregon to the national education association convention.

A program to aid teachers in war-devastated areas of the world was approved at the meeting. Directed by the national educational association through state and local groups, the fund will send food, clothing and supplies overseas.

The fund is to be gathered through cash donations of teachers. In Marion county the local teachers will forward their donations to Mrs. Mae Engle, Woodburn, treasurer of the county teachers' association. Approximately 150 Marion county teachers attended last night's meeting.

PORTLAND, Nov. 20.—(AP)—Circuit Judge Walter L. Tooze recommended from the bench today that the state divert some of its liquor sales revenue to establishment of a hospital for treatment of alcoholics.

He made the statement while sentencing a man convicted for issuing a worthless check while drunk. "Alcoholics are not criminals in fact," said the judge, "they are diseased persons, wholly irresponsible with one hand, the state encourages alcoholism, and with the other it seeks to punish its effects."

Compromise in Fish vs. Dams Dispute Slated

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 20.—(AP)—The Oregonian tonight reported that the federal Columbia basin interagency committee had recommended a compromise settlement of the Pacific northwest fish vs. dams controversy.

The newspaper in a dispatch from Washington, D.C., said the settlement recommended: 1. That construction continue on McNary dam; that five lower Snake river dams as well as Foster Creek dam on the Columbia river, all authorized by congress, be started when money becomes available.

2. That priority thereafter be given to upriver dams, delaying construction of the proposed The Dalles dam until upriver projects are completed.

3. That an attempt be made to transplant upriver salmon runs to lower Columbia river tributaries. The Columbia basin interagency committee, composed of representatives from federal agencies involved in basin development, held a public hearing at Walla Walla last June on a proposed 10-year moratorium on lower river dams.

That proposal would have ruled out the lower Snake river dams for another decade. The Oregonian reported the compromise settlement was not expected to be federal agencies in fisheries groups, who are opposed to further dam building on the Columbia-Snake system for a number of years, or to proponents of a dam at The Dalles, advocated both for power and Columbia river navigation.

Air Reserve Group Hears Meet Report

Members and guests of the newly-formed local Air Reserve assembly heard a report of the national association convention held in Oklahoma City last week. P. D. Van Osadal, Salem delegate to the conference.

VanOsadal informed the Salem group that the air reserve is an integral part of the regular army air forces. Local air reservists told the group that lack of membership is still the only stumbling block to getting planes into Salem.

As soon as the unit is quota of 175 officers and men is reached the group will attain class "C" standing and will be entitled to a group of AT6 and AT11 training planes at the local airport.

Twelve new members were signed last night bringing the total compliment up to half of the quota. Under the direction of President Wilbur McDowell, the approximately 80 men present discussed resolutions pertaining to reservists pay and allowance to fly tactical types of aircraft.
