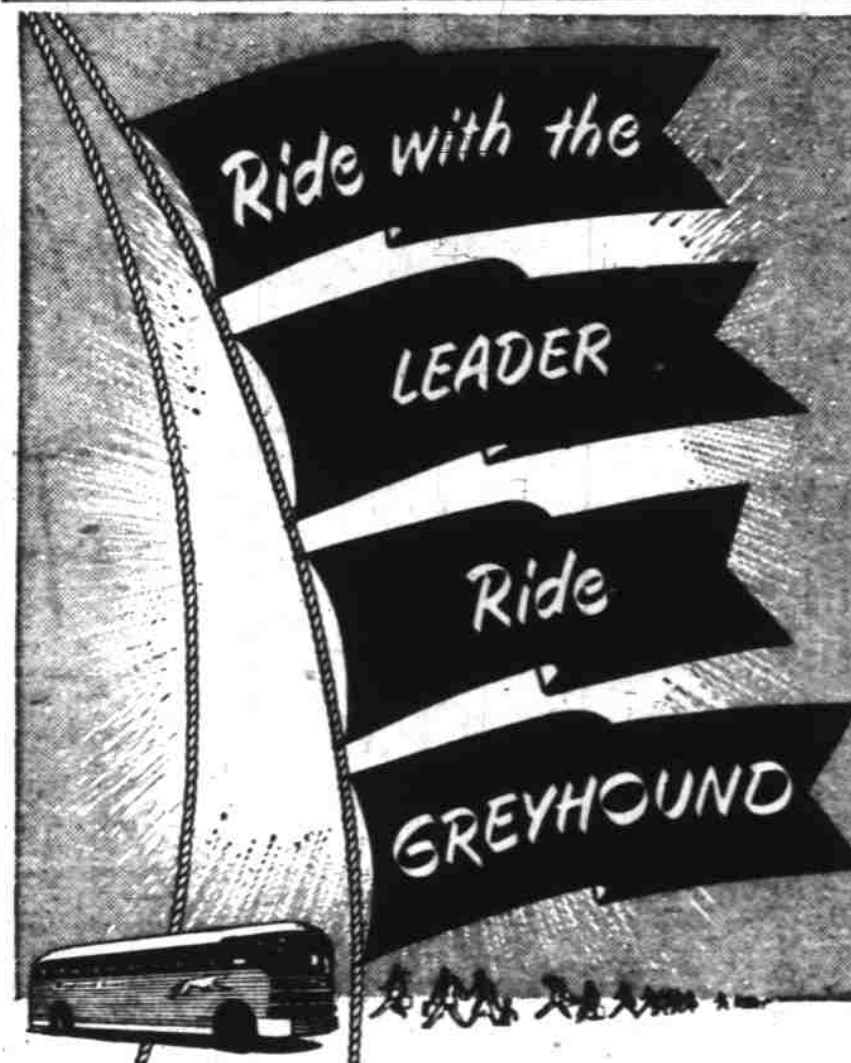
Valley Obituaries
