Gray passed to Laidlaw for 10 and ran for 13 before firing his third touchdown pass toward sub End Ralph Davis who took the ball away from a Nebraskan on the one and went over. Simas missed this one, giving State its 27 to 6 edge, and first win over Nebraska in six starts.

Another feature game in the south today saw Georgia Tech squeeze by Georgia, 7-0, in a Southeastern conference title bid which failed because of the victory by Ole Miss. Georgia Tech is an Orange Bowl nominee against Kansas.

Maryland and North Carolina State fought to a 0-0 tie; Tennessee conquered Vanderbilt, 12-7; North Carolina, with Charlie Justice scoring two touchdowns, romped all over Virginia, 40-7, and Florida hung the 26th straight defeat on hapless Kansas State in an intercollegiate feature at Gainesville, Fla., 25-7, in other southern contests.

In the southwest Rice, pre-season favorite, wound up in third place in the Southwest conference with a 34-6 win over tail-end Baylor, and Oklahoma won Sooner state laurels with a 21-13 triumph over Oklahoma A&M. West Texas State outlasted New Mexico, 28-18.

In the east Holy Cross defeated Boston college, 25-6; West Virginia, playing its last game for recently resigned Coach Bill Kern, downed off-beaten Pittsburgh, 17-2, and in the battle of New York, Fordham and New York university settled for a 13-13 draw.

ROSEBURG, Nov. 29—(AP)—Amity high school bowled over Myrtle Creek high, 45 to 6, here today in their class B school football semi-final tournament game and moved into the championship tilt. The Warriors will meet Henley high, the defending B champion, next week for the crown. Henley defeated Union High, 6 to 0, in the other semi-final game last night. The hefty Amity squad jumped to a quick first quarter lead, eased up slightly in the final minutes of the second period to allow the Myrtles their only score, and then closed the half with a 26-6 edge. Rowan Gallops Big-9 Chief Investigates

CHICAGO, Nov. 29—(AP)—Commissioner Kenneth L. (Tug) Wilson of the Big Nine is investigating reported laxities of athletic policy at several conference schools and will read the law to athletic directors on the subject at the league's winter meeting here December 11-13.

Wilson today admitted that "it is my duty as commissioner to investigate constantly rumors of recruiting irregularities," but it was learned the commissioner intends to hold a lively star chamber session with athletic officials to get all hands in line with the conference code.

It was not indicated what schools were under surveillance.

Rowan Gallops Army to Win

Just before the Memphis flash pulled his stunner, the Middies had put on a determined 74-yard drive down to Army's eight yard line; where they had piled up. They were giving the Cadets a mighty battle and were well ahead both in yardage gained and in first downs.

After they had chased Rowan across the final stripe, Coach Tom Hamilton's pupils were through. They made only three more first downs in the remainder of the game — one of those on a roughing penalty — and never again carried the ball even close to midfield. From that point on there was never a doubt that the Cadets were en route to their fourth straight victory in the service classic.

The game, annual climax of the eastern gridiron season, started under ideal conditions. The field, the dry, the temperature in the mid-forties. As the day warmed, however, the sky became quite overcast and a light rain fell for about five minutes.

So one-sided was the conflict after Rowan fled his 92 yards that it was surprising to learn the Navy had made more first down than the victors — 13 to 9. The Cadets, however, accumulated their yardage in large, economy size chunks. They ground out 234 yards by rushing to the Middies' 99, and that proved the difference. Navy's aerial attack gained 94 yards to Army's 46.
