Stock Market **Emerges from**

Losing Week NEW YORK, Nov. 29-(A)-The wavering stock market today emerged from a slow and losing month with scattered leaders making timid recovery gestures but with many issues continuing in the minus ranks.

The Associated Press 60-stock composite was unchanged on the day at 63.8. For the week the index showed a drop of 1.5 points, widest since the period ended August 8, and for November a net decline of 1.6. The two-hour aggregate of 390,000 shares compared with 320,000 a week ago. The 5-day total of 3,874,960 shares stacked up against 4,989,460 for the preceding six sessions. The November volume of 16,370,922 shares was a low for that month since 1941. The October figure of 28,634,629 was the top for the year to date. Whether it was the boosting of brokerage commissions as of the first of the month, or other factors, there were only two million-shade days in November.
