Upswing in Stocks Starts Slowing Down

NEW YORK, Dec. 16.—(AP)—The recovery shift faltered in today's stock market although selected rails and industrials managed to keep in the plus ranks.

Eight consecutive sessions without an average loss inspired some cashing in by professionals who figured that a technical correction of the early December drop had been consummated and the list left in a more or less vulnerable position. Reinvestment demand still was a factor in offsetting waning tax offerings.

Declines of fractions to a point or so predominated at the close. Volume dwindled to 1,080,000 shares from 1,430,000 of Monday. The Associated Press 60-stock composite was off 2 of a point at 64.3, its first dip since the sharp relapse of Dec. 5. Of 1,075 issues registering, 504 fell and 349 rose.

At highs for 1947 were Superior Oil of Cal., which closed up 6 points at 152 on a few sales; Skelly Oil up 2 at 107 and Fok, Jansbec Steel up 1 1/2 at 38 1/2. Gains of 1 to 2 or better were retained by Mohawk Carpet at 43 1/2, Best Foods at 30 1/2 (on a pleasing dividend), Union Carbide 10 1/2, U.S. Gypsum 10 1/2 and Owens-Illinois 7 1/2.

The state forestry board will meet in Salem Wednesday with Gov. John H. Hall presiding. This will be the first meeting of the forestry board to be attended by the new executive.

Appointment of Charles H. Latourette as justice of the peace of the Cascade Locks district was announced by Governor John H. Hall Tuesday. He succeeds the late Judge C. L. Rankin.
