Decline Noted In Marriage, Divorce Rates

Although court cases filed through the Marion county clerk's office increased during 1947 over the preceding year, a decline was reported in marriage license applications and divorce cases filed.

A total of 1,074 marriage license applications were made at the office during the year just ended compared with 1,229 issued during 1946, according to Marion County Clerk Harlan Judd.

Divorce cases filed in circuit court during the year totaled 419, with approximately 90 per cent resulting in divorces granted, Judd said. Divorce cases filed in 1946 came to 514.

All probate matters filed through the clerk's office in 1947 and handled by Circuit Judges George Duncan and E. M. Page came to 429 as compared with 383 for the year previous. Circuit court matters amounted to 951 during the past year while only 872 were recorded in 1946.

Total county expenditures which passed through Clerk Judd's office last year came to \$1,146,783 as compared with \$980,888 in 1946. These amounts include all moneys paid by the county including payrolls, road expenses, trucks and equipment and other costs.

Fees, including money held in trust by the county clerk's office, will show an all-time high in 1947 when all records are tabulated, Judd estimated.

For the first 11 months of fees collection and the first six months of trust monies counted, during the past year, approximately \$94,199 were collected. Total fees and trust moneys in 1946 came to \$108,306 and in 1945 to \$78,046.

Marion county district court fees collected during the first five months of its operation by District Judge Joseph Felton amounted to \$21,703, Judd said. These fees, including fines, bail and costs, were taken in from July 7, when the court was established, to November 30 of 1947.

A two-day snowstorm and a session of ski instructions were experienced by the 23 senior scouts and leaders from units in the Cascade area council, who returned Tuesday from a four-day winter camp at Camp Pioneer.

A minor casualty occurred Monday when Don Scarborough of Woodburn turned his ankle while skiing and was hauled to the highway on a make-shift sled.

Adult leaders who accompanied the scouts included Clark Leithin and Leighton from Salem, Lowell Brown of Silverton and Leslie Ferris of Independence.
