Butter—Wholesale, F.O.B. bulk cubes, grade AA, 93 score, 88c lb.; A 32 score, 86c lb.; B 30 score, 82c; C 28 score, 80c; second quality, 84-87c; valley route and country points, 2 cents less than first or 90-92.
