Crisp and Fresh

After Holiday Dining Includes Fresh Crisp Salads; Leafy Greens Abundant

One usually has a yen for crisp salads this period following a week or so of pretty heavy eating. Thanksgiving started it all, and Christmas and New Year's entertainment didn't help much. But a few days of sensible eating, with plenty of uncooked greens in salads, and course will get everyone into a mood for heavy meals.

Greens of course form the basis for most salads, and whether you add fruit or vegetables, raw or cooked, jelled or frozen, one has to count on lettuce or other green for at least a garnish.

Though most greens are summer vegetables, we have an abundance of hot-house or southern grown greens, and a few hardy ones which grow locally in winter, to bolster up the salads and make them interesting.

Buying several greens for salads is economy, and not an extravagance, because they keep in the icebox and will serve many meals before they spoil.

Tossed salads are recommended most highly for wintertime eating. A wonderful combination is escarole, chicory and lettuce. Several good cabbages are on the market now, the makings for excellent cole slaw. Watercress has been in market for several weeks in some stores which specialize in salad greens.

You'll make more novel salads and give more interest to the cooking if you mix the greens. Cut lettuce, endive and chicory, perhaps with a dash of raw spinach will give fine flavor.

Best thing to do to green vegetables is to wash them thoroughly, dry them and store in dehydrator or wrap in thin cloth and store.

Other ingredients for tossed vegetable salads in dead of winter are radishes, celery, green peppers, green onions, carrots cut in silvers, raw beets also in silvers and crisp raw turnips.

Best dressings for tossed green salads are French dressing or Thousand Island. For slaw it's either a hot or cold sour cream dressing.

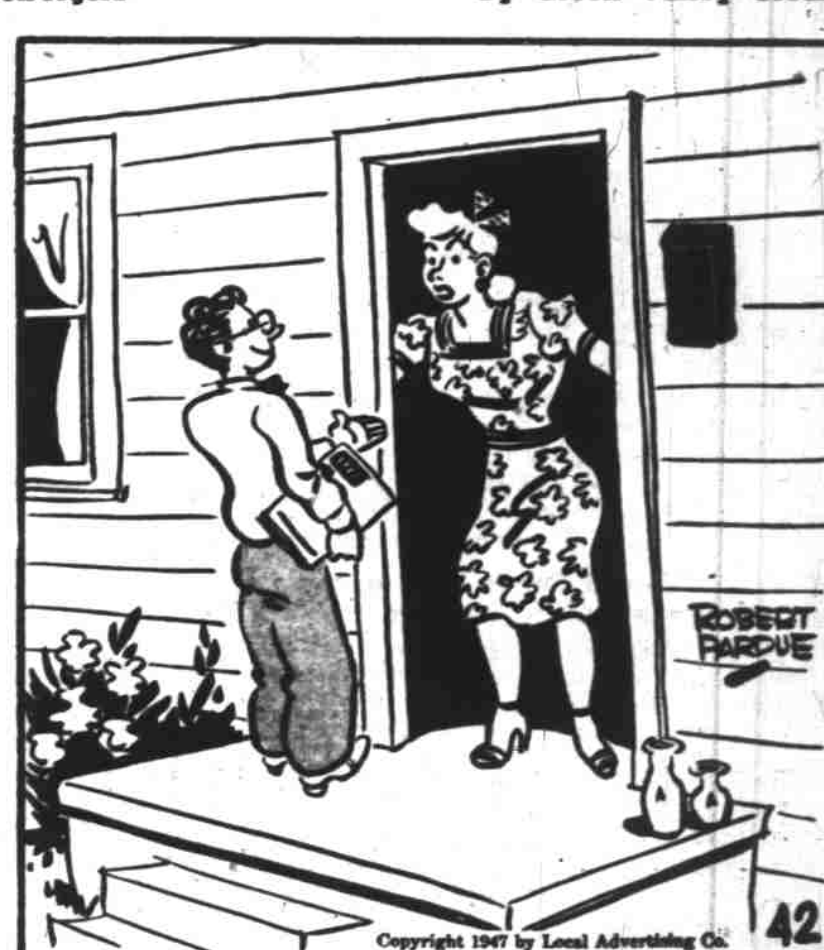
