William Lebold Rites Wednesday At St. Joseph's

Requiem mass will be said at St. Joseph's Catholic church Wednesday at 9 a. m. for William Lebold, Salem resident since 1906, who died at his home in 295 S. 16th, Sunday following a heart attack.

Recitation of the rosary will be held at Clough-Barriek chapel to-night at 8 o'clock. Burial will be in Belcrest Memorial park, Wednesday.

Lebold was born in Illinois, July 30, 1865, and moved to South Dakota with his family in 1883. While in that state he was active in organization of school districts and served several terms as county commissioner and board chairman. He engaged in farming, raising Shorthorn cattle and Percheron horses.

Because of ill health, Lebold sold his interests in South Dakota in 1906 and moved to Salem where he entered the grocery and feed business and worked as a carpenter. In recent years Lebold's business has been wrecking old frame buildings and replacing them with modern brick structures. He was a member of St. Joseph's Catholic church.

Surviving are the widow, Mrs. Eva A. Lebold of Salem; four sons, Lloyd A. Lebold, Emory Lebold, Walter J. Lebold and Eugene A. Lebold, all of Salem; a sister, Margaret Lebold of Salem; two brothers, Joseph Lebold and John B. Lebold, both of Salem; 11 grandchildren and four great grandchildren.
