

## Cocktail Bar At Silverton Recommended

SILVERTON, Jan. 6 — Silverton's first cocktail bar and lounge will open here shortly following recommendation by the city council Monday night. The bar and lounge will have a seating capacity of 40.

Pat Grogan, operator of George's Place, appeared before the council with the request, explaining that he had a liquor license covering his restaurant but that he wanted to separate the cocktail bar from the restaurant because minors were permitted in the restaurant but could be kept out of the lounge.

**Greater Returns Expected** — He also added that one of his prime reasons for asking for the letter of recommendation which would permit the change was that this would bring greater returns on his investment. The council recommended the necessary letter be written to the liquor commission.

In the absence of Mayor George Christenson, Reber Allen presided as mayor Monday night. A number of requests for improvements were presented including street improvement on Fairview and First, with Harry Desart heading the delegation on the former and E. K. Cramer presenting the First street request. Cramer also asked for additional lights on First street. Roy Meyers asked for extension of city water to his newly erected residence on West Main street, and Rodney Oster asked for sewer extension for his proposed new home on James avenue.

**Petitions Scheduled** — Petitions will be presented later on the street improvement requests. The council ordered 56 new mercury vapor lights to be installed in Silverton to cover the business section, and East Oak to Church street, West Main to Center, South Water to Koons and North Water to James. Manager Robert Bond was instructed to go ahead with necessary arrangements. Arrangements were made to take care of the Oster sewer extension, and the extension of the city water mains will be made as soon as material is available. Scarcity in water pipe was stressed at the council meeting Monday night.

A request by Victor David for reduction on pinball taxes was denied. The car wrecking lot license to H. Hagedorn was recommended renewed, and an ordinance regulating tree planting in parking lots and also streets was passed on its third reading.

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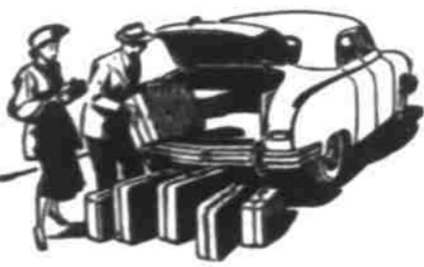
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
