Dump-Truck Rates Boosted In Salem Area

Nearly all dump-truck rates in the Salem area are raised as a result of a Sunday meeting here of the Willamette division of the Oregon Truck Owners-Operators league, according to newly-elected president, Raymond R. Knight of Salem.

Increased costs of operation were cited by Knight as the reason for rate hikes. From the old pre-war rates of \$1 per yard hour, the rates were increased to \$1.30 per yard hour with alternate rates of 14 cents per yard mile for hauls up to five miles and 12 cents per yard mile for hauls over five miles.

The rates affect hauling of sand, gravel, dirt and other dump hauls. According to Knight, a recent survey of truck operations showed that operators have been working for pre-war hauling rates, but have been forced to meet more than a 50 per cent increase in costs of trucks, repairs, labors and parts. Also to be considered, he said, were the recently announced gasoline price boosts and the new mileage rate put into effect January 1 by the state public utilities commission.

Other 1948 officers of the league elected Sunday include Robert D. Key, vice president, and F. J. Brennan, secretary-treasurer, both of Salem. Trustees named include Ray Bruke and Ray McCallister, both of Salem; Frank G. Calkins, Corvallis, and Charles LaRue, Albany.

WU Debaters Tell Kiwanis of World Union

Tom Bartlett of Salem and Jack Gunn of Monmouth, two of the all-freshman debate squad at Willamette university, discussed establishment of a world government in a symposium at Salem Kiwanis club Tuesday at the Marion hotel.

Dr. Herbert Rahe, head of the speech department at the university, introduced the members of the squad which included Bob Sayre, Charles Mills, Elliott Motschenbacher, Jerry Igo, Bartlett and Gunn.

Bartlett opened the discussion as speaker for the affirmative on the question "Resolved that a World Government Should Be Established." He urged it as a preventative of war to "work on the spores of war instead of the sores of war" and dwell upon the alleged failure of the United Nations.

Gunn said that world government could not be made to function until the nations of the world were closer together sociologically which he pointed out was not accomplished merely because all parts of the world are within 60 hours distance of each other.

Hagana Given Rebuke for Blasting Hotel

JERUSALEM, Jan. 6 (AP) — The Palestine government today sharply rebuked Hagana, the Jewish defense army, for the "dastardly and wholesale murder of innocent people" in the blasting of the Semiramis hotel.

The government announced it was "carefully considering the situation created by the action of Hagana in publicly claiming credit for yesterday's blasting that killed 19 Arabs and the acting consul for the Spanish government."

This morning rescue workers liberated a 28-year-old Arab woman who had been imprisoned in the ruins of the hotel for 34 hours beside the body of her four-year-old son.

Neither official or unofficial sources gave any hint of what the British were prepared to do to cope with the growing state of disorder now approaching anarchy and civil war in the Holy Land.

Scattered violence during the day raised to 600 the unofficial count of persons slain in the Holy Land since the Nov. 29 decision of the United Nations in favor of partition.

Hagana said the Semiramis hotel in the fashionable Katamon residential section of Jerusalem had been blasted because it was a distinct headquarters of an Arab military organization. This was denied by an Arab spokesman and the Palestine government.

A spokesman for the Jewish agency said the death of the Spanish official was a "tragedy," and added that "the fact so many innocents were killed may have been due to faulty intelligence work by Hagana." He said the Jewish defense force has been "cautioned to be more careful in the future."

Scouts Ready Annual 'Week'; Will Pick 'Outstanding Boy'

In preparation for national Boy Scout week February 6 to 12, the Cascade area scout council this week is conducting a survey of 1947 scout activities in this area.

The council executive staff also will have charge of choosing the "outstanding scout" of this council, who will in turn compete with 26 other council representatives for choice as region 11 national representative.

Twelve regional scout representatives will then present a scout activities report to President Truman and to the United Nations assembly.

The reports will consist of a survey of scouts' civic service in 1947, the Salem scout officer reported Monday.

This week each of the 81 troops and senior units in the Cascade area has been asked to send representatives for their "outstanding scout." A committee, consisting of one member of the council executive board, a commissioner, scoutmaster and scout office staff member will then pick a council choice.

The council's choice, whether he wins the regional vote or not, will be given an expense-paid trip to the national council meeting in Seattle in May.

Reappointment of Chandler Sought

Many letters are being received at the governor's office here urging reappointment of Ben Chandler, Coos Bay, as a member of the state highway commission. His term expires in March.

Chandler was appointed a member of the commission by the late Gov. Earl Snell to succeed Merle Chessman, Astoria, who resigned when the state supreme court ruled he could not serve both as a member of the commission and state senator from Clatsop county.

Garden Road Protest Stirs Court to Action

Marion county court will convene from the old Garden road to consider the petition filed Monday protesting the change in name of the street.

The protest against the name change was filed by residents along the city limits. Spokesman for the 61 said the court's hearing was not publicized well enough and that Garden road was an old established name. Garden road is an extension on Market street.

"After proper publication of the hearing and after considerable other publicity given it, the change to Market street was given the old Garden road on recommendation of the Salem city council," Judge Murphy said.

"Having no personal interest in the matter, members of the court would probably not have made the change if substantial opposition had appeared. However, not one protest was heard," the judge said.

Innocent Pleas Lodged by 4 Boys On Conduct Charge

Trials will be conducted January 16 for four youths who pleaded innocent Tuesday in Salem municipal court to charges of disorderly conduct, in connection with the alleged theft of a "bombsight" ornament from an auto early Sunday morning.

The youths, remaining free on \$50 bail each, are Glenn Graber, 675 N. 17th st.; Bernard Phillips, YMCA; Howard Girod, 605 Market st.; and Bruce Hamilton, 622 N. 17th st.
