Movie Studios Sued by Three Alleged 'Reds'

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 7 (AP)—Three high salaried film personalities filed suit for a total of \$3,165,925 today against movie studios which dismissed two of them and suspended the third for refusal to answer questions before a house committee on un-American activities, sitting in Washington.

The three are writers Ring Lardner, Jr. and Lester Cole, and producer-director Edward Dmytryk. Lardner and Dmytryk sought damages of \$1,382,500 and \$1,783,425, respectively, while Cole merely asked a court order of declaratory relief and return to the payroll.

Damaged Reputation

Dmytryk, who said he was under a two-year contract at \$2,500 weekly, directed his suit against RKO studio, alleging damage to his artistic reputation and "humiliation and anguish" as a result of his dismissal. Lardner sued 20th Century Fox, making similar charges, and demanded, in addition to the damages, that his \$1,150 a week contract be declared in force. Cole's suit was directed at Loew's, Inc., and Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer studio and asked an injunction ordering the studio to put him back on the payroll.

The three men and seven other Hollywood writers and film executives were cited for contempt of congress for refusing to state whether or not they are or had been members of the communist party. They testified before the Thomas committee, which is still inquiring into communistic influences in Hollywood.

May Not Work Elsewhere

Morris E. Cohn, attorney for Cole, said MGM's contract calls for Cole's exclusive services and that the studio contends that while he is suspended without his \$2,000 weekly salary he may not work elsewhere.

"Cole could ignore the contract and work elsewhere, but he prefers to test the validity of the contract through this suit," said Cohn.

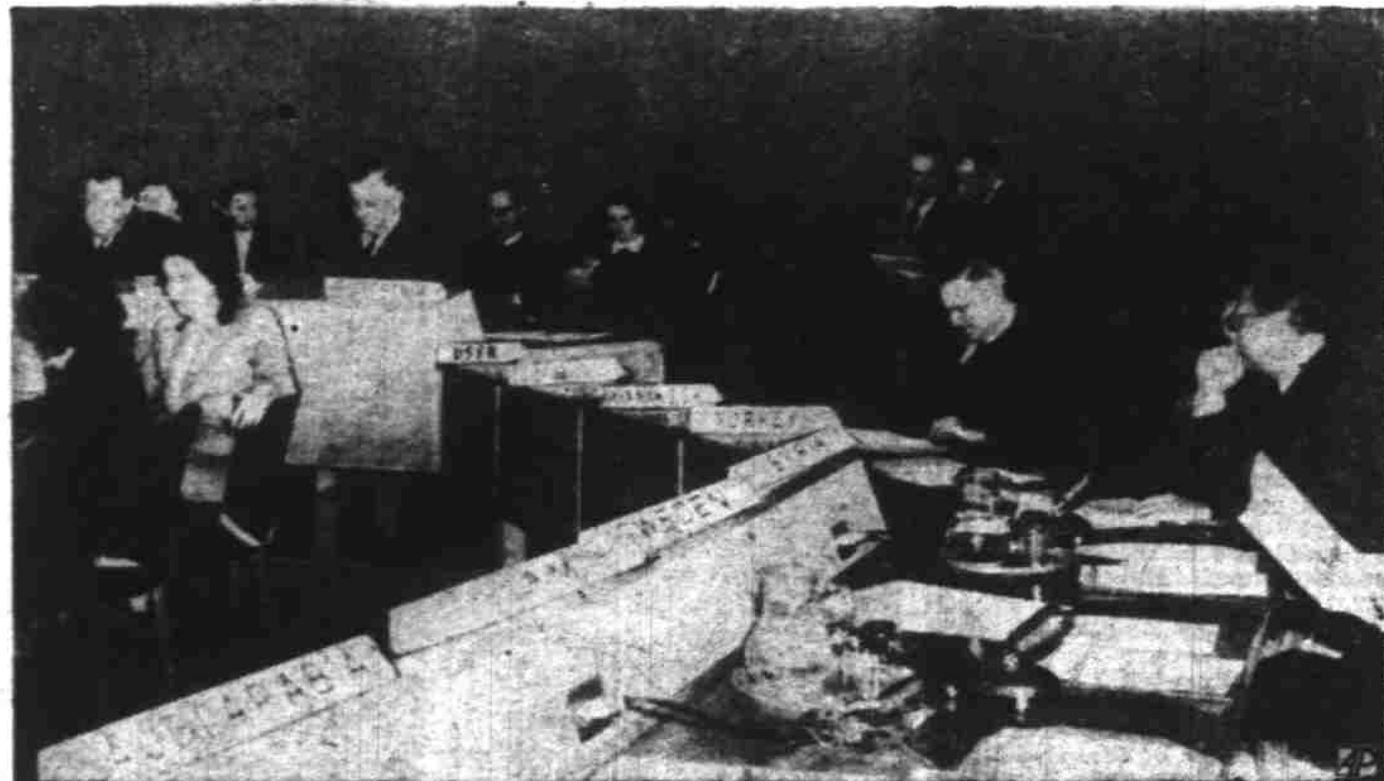

Balkans Warned by U. S. Not to Recognize Greek 'Free State'

WASHINGTON, Jan. 7 (AP)—The United States and Great Britain today warned Yugoslavia and Bulgaria of the "serious implications" that would result from recognition of the so-called "free state" proclaimed by communist guerrillas in northern Greece.

American and British diplomatic representatives called on the foreign nations to think twice before making such a move, noting that such recognition would be clearly contrary to the principles of the United Nations charter.

It would amount, the U. S. representative said, to "open disregard of the recent recommendations of the United Nations assembly" which sent a special commission to investigate the Balkan conflict.

Michael J. McDermott, state department press officer, told reporters the warning was conveyed orally and represented the American position as first stated by Undersecretary of State Lovett December 30.

At that time Lovett told a news conference that future American moves would depend on the circumstances. Since then the navy has dispatched tank-supported marines to naval forces now in the Mediterranean and has assigned Vice Admiral Forrest P. Sherman, who was chief planning officer for Fleet Admiral Chester W. Nimitz, to command the Mediterranean task force.

Today's diplomatic moves capped a series of developments arising from the proclamation Christmas week of the communist state by Markos Vafiades, Greek guerrilla leader, who simultaneously launched an abortive offensive to capture Konitsa to serve as the capital for the "free state."

A resolution of the Lake county chamber of commerce commending the recent action of the state liquor control commission in removing a restriction of the old liquor commission under which beer dispensing licenses would not be granted or renewed where immediately adjacent to gasoline pumps, was received by Gov. John H. Hall here Wednesday.

The chamber said the restriction, in the judgment of its members, would have been productive of an unfair situation and one falling in accomplishment of any constructive purpose.
