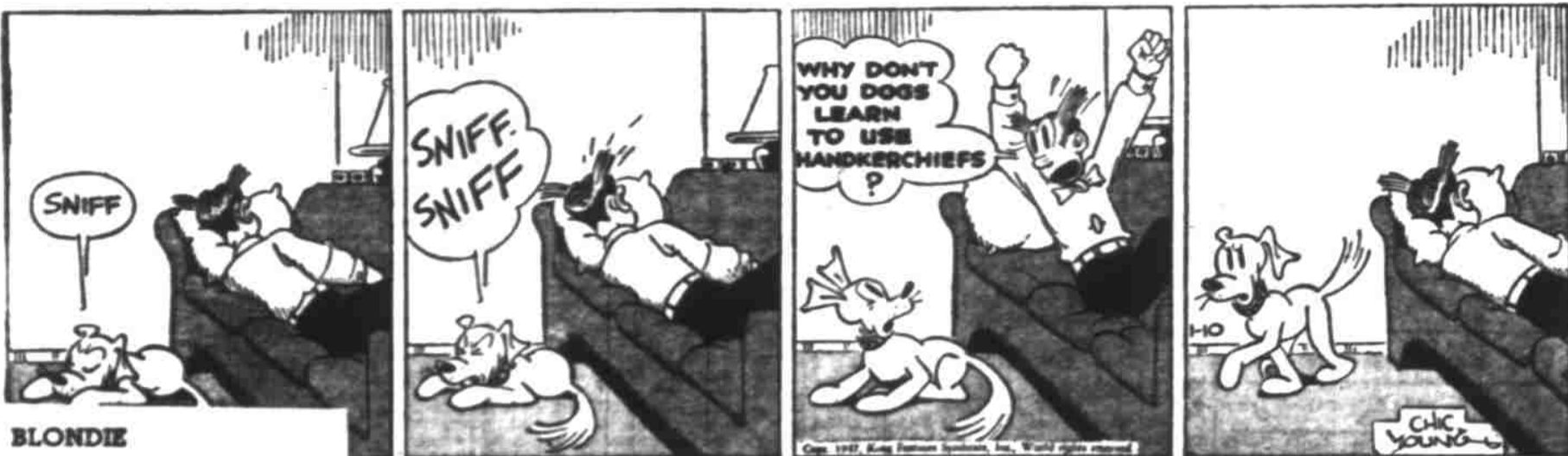

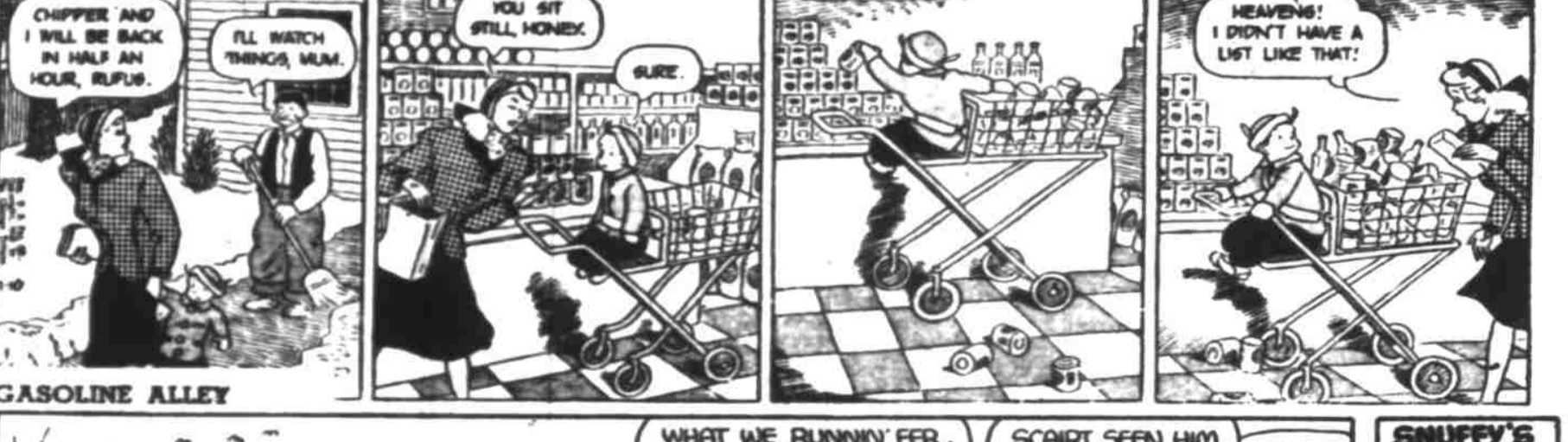

Strong Demand Recorded in Grain Market

CHICAGO, Jan. 9 (AP)—All commodities traded on the board of trade today encountered a strong demand and before the session was over another batch of new seasonal all-time records were recorded. Best prices were made right at the close when activity expanded.

New seasonal highs were scored by May and July corn, March, May and December oats and all soybean contracts. The high on March oats, \$1.32½, was a new peak for any oats contract in the board's history. March soybeans, selling at \$4.28½, set a record for any soybean delivery.

Wheat closed 1½-¾ higher, May \$2.97½-¾; corn was 1½-¾ higher, May \$2.60-2.60½; oats were ½-¼ higher, May \$1.24-¼, and soybeans were up the 5-6-cent range, March \$4.28½.

In back of the grain strength was disappointment over the marketing of wheat with the turn of the year. Dealers said receipts were not as large as had been anticipated.

Floods were reported as endangering wheat lands in the Pacific northwest, but otherwise crop comment was favorable. Modern Miller, a trade publication, said there was still a fairly large acreage to be planted in parts of west Texas and central and southwestern Kansas.
