The session will be devoted to several important governmental issues. Mrs. Blair Stewart, president, has announced.

A dinner meeting of the board Thursday night at the Eugene hotel will precede the Friday conference. Discussion of state program items and an appraisal of accomplishments since the area trade conference held in Portland in October, with emphasis on the importance of international trade and the need for acquainting the public with details of the Marshall plan will be held.

Possible recommendations for change in the state tax structure, will also be considered, and a state budget.

Among those taking part will be Mrs. James Schick of Forest Grove, on reforestation and conservation problems, and Mrs. M. P. Leonard of Klamath Falls, on possible legislation to place juvenile work under the department of social welfare.
