Aircraft, Other Select Stocks Make Headway

NEW YORK, Jan. 15-(AP)—Aircraft and other selected stocks made some recovery headway today although most leaders continued to seek losing ground.

Dealings were sluggish throughout the sixth straight session, failed to score a plus sign. Aviation, apathetic most of the day, stiffened in the final hour on renewed

hopes of big military orders. The majority of the recently buoyant oils slipped. While advances running to 2 points were fairly well distributed at the close, declines predominated. Transfers of 780,000 shares compared with 820,000 Wednesday and were a low for a full stretch since the initial 1948 session.

Professional short covering and other timid buying was based on the idea the list might be due for a technical comeback. Public customers, on the whole, brokers reported, were "out of the market."

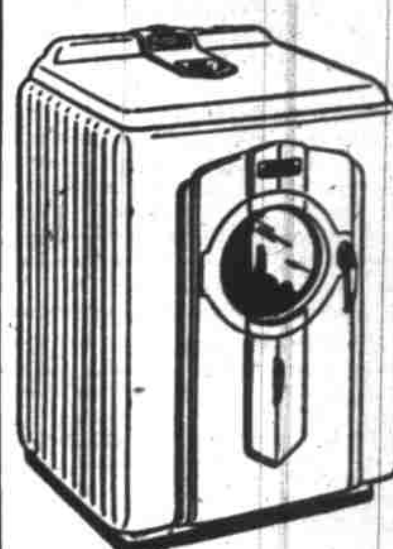
The Associated Press 60-stock composite was off .2 of a point at 64.2, a low since Dec. 15. Of 941 issues registering, 427 fell and 287 rose.
