Approximately 115 members of the Oregon Academy of Science attended the annual conference at Willamette university Saturday, representing most of the colleges in the state.

Dr. Warren D. Smith, emeritus professor of geology at University of Oregon, was installed as president. W. E. Mill, mathematics professor at Oregon State college, was elected vice president to become president next year. Pierre van Rysselberghe of University of Oregon was re-elected treasurer. Dr. Smith's inaugural address was on "The Social Significance of Science."

Among displays at the conference was one in the biology section provided and arranged by Dr. Cecil R. Monk of Willamette university.

Men Recruited

Candidacy for Mayor Based On Experience

Robert L. Elfstrom, Salem's mayor since city charter amendments put a city manager form of government in effect Jan. 1, 1947, issued the following statement in connection with announcing his candidacy for reelection this year:

"In recent weeks I have been presented with the question of whether or not I should run for re-election as mayor of Salem. I have been asked to make an early decision thereon. "I have thoroughly enjoyed the work thus far as mayor of the good people of Salem and the fine cooperation which I have received from the members of the city council, city manager and all others connected with the city administration. The fine spirit of cooperation on the part of all these people has greatly eased the burden of the responsibilities that go with being mayor since 1947.

"During my first year as mayor it has taken considerable time to become acquainted with the problems confronting a rapidly growing city. I personally feel that now, after having had a year's experience in the office, that I can do a better job of serving the people of Salem than I could in my first year.

"Following that a step further, the experience of one term of office I think would better qualify me to serve a second term, as I would at that time be more familiar with Salem's city government and would need not go through this formative period of becoming familiar with our needs. "I feel, too, that every citizen owes his community a certain amount of service. The question arises as to how much active participation need we do in order to do our bit. "It is my well considered opinion that I should again seek re-election as mayor of Salem, and I propose to do so if it meets with the approval of the citizens of Salem."
