Salem Labor Urges Voter Registration

In line with the announced policy of local and state American Federation of Labor officials, members of Salem's labor unions are being urged to register to vote at the Labor temple.

Sponsored by cannery workers local 670, a deputized vote registrar, Mrs. Theres Hassenstab, has been registering voters of all locals at the union headquarters since December. The registration will go on until the coming elections, union officials said.

"All members of organized labor, and every other voter, for that matter, are being urged to get out and vote in state and national elections, regardless of how they vote," F. M. Keith, president of the Salem Trades and Labor council, said Monday.

Herbert Baker, executive secretary of the council, reported that an educational campaign soon will be sparked by a committee made up of representatives from all locals in connection with voter's responsibilities.

Deputy Fallon To Retire Feb. 1

Robert Fallon, Marion county deputy sheriff since last June 26, has resigned his position effective February 1, he said Monday.

Fallon is withdrawing under the state retirement act, which provides for retiring of employees past their 60th year. Sheriff Denver Young said Monday he had no successor to Fallon in mind.

Fallon came to the Sheriff's office following service of more than 39 years in the navy. The last five years of his military career had been spent in charge of the Salem navy recruiting office.

The deputy said Monday that he had no immediate plans for the future.

Group Told of School Plant's Lag Since 1937

Salem school district's proposed \$3,500,000 building program would end a 10-year virtual drought of building and a 20-year era with a net gain of only one elementary classroom, civic group leaders of the area were informed Monday night by Superintendent Frank Bennett and school board members.

Last year's gymnasium and heating plant at senior high school were the only real additions since 1937, when the senior high and Bush elementary were completed. Bush's 12 rooms and additions totaling six rooms replaced 17 rooms which disappeared with the discard of Yew Park and Lincoln schools.

The proposal that public kindergartens be added to the building program came up only briefly last night, with a question by John Hay of Salem Exchange club. Bennett said the matter is not delayed for the duration of the five-year program, but that adequate facilities must first be provided for children already in school. The question of whether kindergartens may be added will appear on a school ballot later this year.

The superintendent displayed a series of charts showing growth of population and school facilities over a 50-year period and projecting the former into the future as determined by last October's census of children already born and living in the district. If the birth rate does not increase and no influx occurs, the present enrollment in all schools will go from the present 6,639 to 7,332 in five years, 8,992 in 10 years and 9,532 by 1961-62.

With no promises of priority or even fulfillment, Bennett outlined the following program to meet estimated five-year needs: New grade schools in Capitola, Four Corners and somewhere east of Englewood; addition of classrooms and/or cafeterias and play areas to Bush, Englewood, Highland, McKinley, Middle Grove, Auburn, Swegle, Pringle and West Salem elementary; replacement of Grant and Liberty if expansion continues; eventual discard of Washington.

New West Salem junior high, additions of gymnasium and cafeteria to Parrish junior high; bleachers at Leslie. Addition of music rooms and more shop space at senior high, to provide facilities curtailed by lack of funds in 1937. This would not, Bennett assured, contemplate making the present building the only senior high school, but would make it adequate for 10 years or more by raising its capacity to 2,000 students. Considerable property has already been acquired for a south Salem site.

Farmers Talk Water Control

AURORA, Jan. 19 — Approximately 75 landowners with acreage in the proposed Pudding river water control district met Tuesday at Aurora grange hall tonight to discuss whether or not the district should be created. Manton Carl, Hubbard rancher, acted as chairman of the meeting.

The Oregon law as it might be applied to the proposed district was explained by Peery Buren, Salem attorney.

Aurora land owners during the discussion expressed concern because of their fear that one of the proposed projects to be accomplished, clearing out log jams farther up stream, would result in more water reaching their farms sooner.

A committee was appointed to circulate petitions asking that the question be submitted to vote of the landowners, in the event the county court gives preliminary approval for the proposed district. Members of this committee are Henry Colvin, C. G. Pusley, P. O. Ottaway, and Elmer Smucker.

Writer Dies at 63

MEDFORD, Jan. 19 — (P) — Death ended the career of Arthur Gordon Perry, 63, veteran columnist and paragrapher of the Medford Mail Tribune here Saturday night.

Perry had written the column, "The Smudge Pot," nearly 35 years. He succumbed after a brief illness.

Gervais Woman Still 'Critical' After Collision

Mrs. Fred Lichte, Gervais, seriously injured in an automobile collision near Stayton Saturday afternoon, was still in "critical" condition in Salem Memorial hospital Monday night, authorities said.

Her husband, Fred Lichte, and Roy E. York, Aberdeen, Wash., injured in the same accident, were both in good condition, attendants reported. Robert Pretzman, Westport, Wash., was killed in the accident. Mr. and Mrs. Lichte and Pretzman were all passengers in a car driven by York which collided with a truck driven by Wayne Gilbert, Aumsville, near the Aumsville cutoff and state highway 222. Gilbert escaped with minor injuries.

Two persons injured in traffic accidents in the Salem area Saturday night were both in local hospitals, but were reported in "good" condition. They are Ralph West, 482 University st., taken to Salem Memorial hospital with a broken wrist after his motor scooter collided with a car at Cottage and State streets, and Jim Plasker, 665 Marion st., in Salem General hospital with a broken collarbone after his truck overturned near Lincoln.

L. H. Hudson, 2265 Center st., who received a severe head laceration early Sunday morning when struck by a car at Hood street and Fairgrounds road, was dismissed from Salem General hospital after being treated at the hospital.
