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Sheepbreeders Oppose Dean Of Agriculture

CORVALLIS, Jan. 19 — Dean William A. Schoenfeld's ideology on controlled agriculture drew fire from the Oregon Purebred Sheepbreeders' association at its annual meeting held here Saturday. A resolution was passed stating that Schoenfeld, dean of agriculture at the state college, has "in public utterances advocated an agricultural program for Europe modeled after the controlled system of British agriculture." Besides opposing his advocacy of the control plan, the sheepbreeders, in the same resolution reaffirmed their belief that this system of agriculture be made part of the Marshall plan for the agriculture of Europe.

Another resolution asked for veterinary service to exhibitors at Oregon state fair and at the Pacific International exposition. Two Salem men were honored at the meeting when Ronald V. Hogg was elected president, replacing E. F. Hubbard of Corvallis, and Claude Steustloff, Southdown breeder, was presented the Sheep Breeder trophy awarded each year to the exhibitor at the Oregon State fair whose sheep, by their breed type and attractiveness, contribute most to the show.

Other officers named were Edie Ahrens, Romney breeder of Turner, vice president; Karl Wipper and Henry Ahrens, Turner, and Floyd Edwards, Albany, directors. Hold-over directors are Eldon Riddell of Monmouth, Chauncey Hubbard of Monroe and M. N. Steustloff of Salem. Eugene Hubbard was made honorary director.

Dr. Julius Norby, director of a Western sheep breeding laboratory at Dubois, Idaho, was principal speaker at the evening banquet.

Dr. A. L. Strand, president of the state college, told how rapidly agriculture had forged ahead in recent years. He admitted that the college had experienced difficulty in keeping abreast of agriculture's rapid stride, but indicated that a little more time, with perhaps a little more funds, would soon put the college out in the lead again.

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Arrested, Asks Prison Return

A former inmate of the Oregon state penitentiary who told Salem police he wants to go back to prison waived preliminary examination in Marion county district court Monday on a charge of forgery and was bound over to the grand jury.

He is John E. Winn, 1590 Lee st. He was arrested by city detectives Monday morning on a district court warrant charging him with cashing two forged checks totaling \$47 at a local grocery store recently. Detectives said Winn also admitted cashing four other checks on Salem merchants totaling \$140. He told police he had served an 18-month sentence at the penitentiary and would like to return to prison.

Winn is being held in the county jail in lieu of \$1,500 bail.

Saalfeld Reports Veteran Services

Finding a home, getting a job or an education continued to be main problems confronting veterans at the beginning of this year, according to a semi-annual report issued Monday by H. C. Saalfeld, Marion county service officer.

Marion county veterans, Saalfeld reported, increased their total home mortgage debts during the last half of 1947 by \$4,600,000. His office reinstated \$100,000 worth of GI insurance and assisted in converting over \$50,000 worth into regular policies. A total of 1,157 contacts with veterans was made during the last half of 1947, he said.

Volunteers Start Remodeling Inside Of Labor Temple

Remodeling of the Salem Labor temple interior to provide almost double the current office space began this week.

When completed, the addition will include 11 new offices, two conference rooms and one recreation room. No time limit has been set for completion of the job, which is being done by volunteer union members. F. M. Keith, president of the Salem Trades and Labor council, said Monday.

The renovation project will eventually include even the front part of the building, now used for officers. Keith said. The work is expected to cost \$10,000.

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Early Resident Of Salem Dies At Age of 96

Mrs. Laura J. (Keene) U'Ren, pioneer Salem resident, died suddenly at the home of her daughter and son-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Charles Mingle, Monday morning at the age of 96 years.

She was born in Rochester, N. Y., Dec. 6, 1852, and came to Oregon at the age of seven with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Henry Keene, late residents of Waldo Hills. She attended Salem public schools and on Dec. 27, 1871, was married to William C. U'Ren, who died three years ago.

The couple moved to Spokane four years after their marriage and returned to Salem five years ago. Mrs. U'Ren was a member of the First Methodist church.

She is survived by four daughters, Dr. Mae Longnecker of Long Beach, Calif., Hazel DuPortus of San Francisco, Bernice Riggs of Olympia, Wash., and Inez Mingle of Salem; a son, Alonzo U'Ren of Hoberg, Calif.; a sister, Mrs. Bertha A. Smith of Portland; five grandchildren and one great grandchild.

New telephone rates will go into effect with the next telephone bills, beginning with those dated January 11. These new rates have been approved by the Public Utilities Commissioner of Oregon following extensive hearings. Increased costs reduced the current earnings of this business in Oregon to a point far below even the minimum generally conceded as necessary. Our rates, generally, have not been increased since 1921 in most Oregon cities and towns.

Our policy with respect to earnings and service will continue to be: To render an ever improving telephone service at a cost as low as is consistent with financial safety and fair treatment to employees.

There are also some rate revisions, effective January 10, in long distance rates within the state. The five-minute initial period has been reduced to three minutes for station-to-station rates on 15c, 20c and 25c routes. Certain adjustments have been made in person-to-person rates and in the night and Sunday rates starting at 33 miles. Report charges have been eliminated, and some decreases in rates apply on intrastate station-to-station calls covering 175 miles and longer.
