Independence Makes Water Damage Estimate

INDEPENDENCE — Estimated damage from the high waters to the revetment at the Murphy bar two miles south of Independence on the Marion county side of the Willamette river is \$10,000.

The revetment was put in last summer by Eldon and Dennis, Portland contractors, for the government at a cost of \$156,000. The current damaged the revetment in three places, one at the west end and in two places near the center where it broke through leaving gaps of from 100 to 200 feet.
