School Budget Proposal Sets County Record

A record \$255,400 budget will be up for approval of the Marion county non-high school board at the board's annual budget hearing Saturday, January 31, at 2 p. m. in the office of Mrs. Agnes Booth, Marion county school superintendent.

The budget includes expenses incurred in educating high school students from non-high school districts in the county's 14 high schools. Largest item in the budget goes for tuition not yet determined for this year. Of last year's \$200,684 budget, \$198,800 was paid out in tuition expenses.

This year's budget, arranged at a budget committee meeting last month, is largest because of the steadily increasing high school student population, higher school operating expenses and tuition increases, Mrs. Booth said.

If the budget is approved January 31, then it goes up for final hearing before the Marion county rural school district board, meeting February 7. The non-high board is made up of five members headed by Chairman Ernest Werner of Central Howell. Mrs. Booth is secretary.
