

Newberg Girl To Represent Oregon on Trip

Betty M. Anderson, Newberg high school student, Thursday afternoon was selected at a drawing in the executive department to participate in the Daughters of the American Revolution pilgrimage from Oregon. Gov. John H. Hall drew her name from a hat. Miss Anderson will be honored with a trip to Washington, D. C., with her expenses paid, and will be Oregon's representative in a group of girls similarly selected from other states.

The drawing was made from the names of 21 high school girls. All of the girls previously had been selected by students and teachers as representatives of the participating high schools because of their outstanding qualities of good citizenship.

Witnessing the drawing were Mrs. J. H. Bennett, state chairman of the good citizenship pilgrimage for Oregon; Rex Putnam, state superintendent of public instruction; Mrs. C. E. Daughter Held In Chains for Near 20 Years

GOSHEN, Ind., Jan. 22.—(AP)—A bearded Amishman was held in jail here tonight under \$1,000 bond, accused by Sheriff Luther Yoder of having kept a daughter either roped or chained for nearly 20 years because she "refused to become Amish."

The sheriff identified the man as Samuel Hochstetler and said he was an elder in the northeastern Clinton township Amish church in Elkhart county. Yoder said he had made a personal investigation at the Hochstetler farm home seven miles east of here yesterday and found the 41-year-old daughter, Lucy, bound in bed with chains, with both wrists bruised and one bleeding. He then filed an affidavit charging the father with assault and battery.

The father was arrested this afternoon. He will be given a preliminary hearing tomorrow.

Hochstetler, who is about 75 years old, submitted quietly to arrest and would not discuss to newsmen the charge placed against him.

The sheriff said Hochstetler told him the daughter had been kept under restraint "every since she refused to become Amish at the age of 21." Yoder also quoted the father as saying the daughter was "unbalanced" and that a "well-fare lady" had informed him it would be "all right" to keep her chained.

Yoder said he questioned Miss Hochstetler briefly and she answered his questions intelligently.

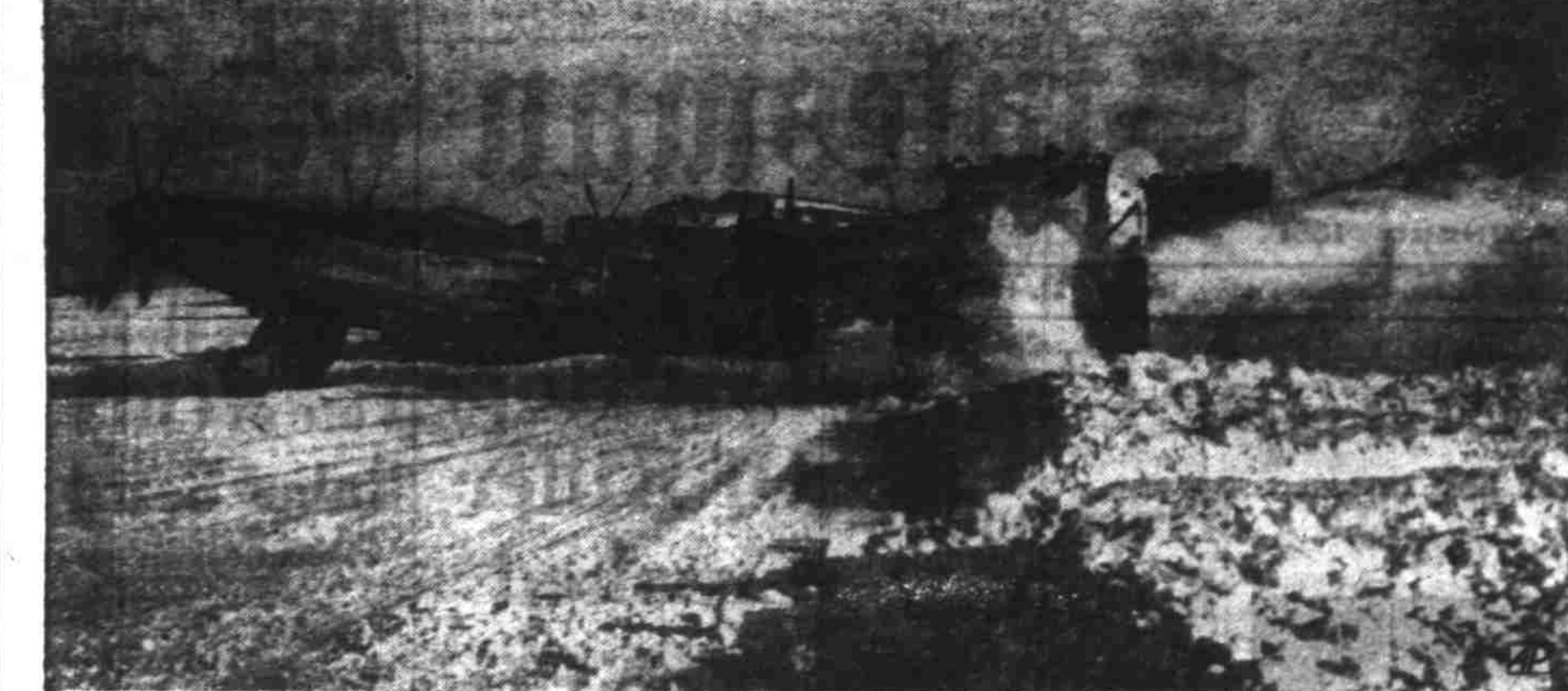

Road Board to Ban Cars from Landing Strip

State Highway Engineer R. H. Baldock announced Thursday the State Highway Commission probably would ban motor vehicles and pedestrians from using the emergency airplane landing strip abutting the Aurora-Wilsonville highway as a solution of the problem created when the "hot rod" boys started racing their cars there some time ago.

Trespass notices will be recommended to the highway commission, Baldock said.

State police officers, at the request of farmers living along the highway and federal officials, Sunday visited the strip where they obtained the names of approximately 75 "hot rod" drivers and ordered their cars off the oval. It was charged that the drivers had prevented a plane from landing on the emergency strip. No law was violated, insofar as state police were able to determine, they said.

Once the strip is posted then the boys who use it would be in violation of law, Baldock declared.

Naval Reservists Get Cruise Orders

Initial orders for the required annual cruise were issued to some members of the Salem naval reserve unit, meeting at the airport Thursday night.

The cruises will be conducted in series with the first local contingent of men leaving here February 29. The cruises will be for two weeks aboard a navy ship along the west coast. Naval reservists from this area will board ship in Seattle, Wash.

Reclamation Bill Sent to Senate

WASHINGTON, Jan. 22.—(AP)—The house changed the Rockwell reclamation bill today despite vigorous objections and sent it to the senate.

The house approved version would:

1. Limit the repayment period for reclamation project power unit costs to 50 years.
2. Require congressional approval of any reclamation project.

Furacin Drug Gives Germs Indigestion

PHILADELPHIA, Jan. 22.—(AP)—Science came up today with a new way to cure some skin infections—give the bacteria indigestion.

The drug is made from corn and is called Furacin, Dr. Morris H. Green of the University of Pennsylvania told the Philadelphia section of the American Chemical society. It prevents a great many microorganisms from digesting sugar and related substances essential to their nutrition.

Meanwhile, Evans, who suffered serious leg injuries, was taken Sunday to the U. S. veterans hospital at Portland, where his left leg was amputated at the knee Tuesday. His condition was reported Thursday night as "out of danger."

Evans and his cycle collided at Marion and Capitol streets with a car driven by Dale W. Trude, 1180 Shipping st.

The son of Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Evans, 1144 Madison st., Evans has operated his service for the past 14 years. Members of the motorcycle club, who are planning to ride to Portland to visit Evans Sunday afternoon, will continue their volunteer service until he can decide what he wants to do with the business, according to Dave Scott, president.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 22.—(AP)—Rep. Knutson (R-Minn.) predicted today that his bill to cut individual income taxes by over \$6,000,000,000 this year "will become law by March 15."

He made the prediction in halling a plan advanced by Herbert Hoover to hold down the sum to be spent on foreign aid. Other lawmakers will welcome such an opportunity for saving money, Knutson said, and declared it will make his bill doubly "veto proof."

Truman Seeks Additional Billion

WASHINGTON, Jan. 22.—(AP)—President Truman asked congress today for another \$1,320,174,315 to round out government costs for the fiscal year ending June 30—and revived an old tax fund argument with republicans.

Most of the total — \$800,000,000 — would be set aside for tax refunds. This is the same amount that congress cut out of his requests a year ago, republicans calling it a "savings" and democratic terming it a "phony cut" in the budget.

Civil War Veteran to Fete 99th Birthday

PORTLAND, Jan. 22.—(AP)—Theodore A. Penick, Oregon department commander of the Grand Army of the Republic, will celebrate his 99th birthday tomorrow. "The girls never forget me," said the aged civil war veteran of the Daughters of Union Veterans, who will give him a party tomorrow.

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 22.—(AP)—Lorraine Day obtained her final divorce decree today but Leo Durocher, husband-to-be so far as California laws are concerned, told newsmen they would not be remarried immediately.

Salem Unit of Dairy Co-op Group Elects

Salem unit of the Dairy Cooperative association has elected S. B. Torvond of Silverton chairman and V. E. Goin secretary, succeeding Floyd Bates and Ralph Shepard, respectively.

The unit will submit to the cooperative's annual election meeting in Portland next month the name of Ray Hobson, Polk county dairyman, for reelection to a two-year director's term. It was also voted at a unit meeting in the Mayflower plant here Wednesday night.

Jim Jackson, a former director, talked to the meeting on the growth of the association and complimented the group on the turnout of 175 persons. The meeting also featured a film, "No Hand Stripping," which shows the work of Dr. W. E. Peterson, an authority on milk production. Will Henry, general manager of the association and Marvin Davidson, assistant general manager, discussed general business.

Petrillo Offers to Trade Records For Royalty Fund

WASHINGTON, Jan. 22.—(AP)—James C. Petrillo came forth today with a plan for restoring harmony to the jangled live of the recorded music world—on his own scale.

Through his lawyer, the president of the American Federation of Musicians suggested he might end the ban now imposed if granted a restoration of the union's welfare fund, derived from royalties on phonograph records.

The attorney, Milton Diamond, made the proposal to the house labor committee.

Following today's hearings, Rep. Kearns (R-Pa.) announced he will introduce a bill next week which would grant royalties on records and prohibit radio stations and other commercial outlets from using non-commercial records.

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Woodburn Girl Wins Keep State Green Prize

A Woodburn farm girl, 15-year-old Mary Jo Bean, is doing her part to keep Oregon green.

Mary Jo won second place in last year's state-wide Keep Oregon Green essay, poster, and achievement contest. This year she won first place.

Awards, announced Thursday, disclosed another Woodburn winner, Fred Cummings, who took second place.

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Contrast Provides Charm of Basso-Soprano Concert Here

Contrasts provided much of the charm of the concert at Salem high school auditorium on Thursday night, in which the voices of Sigurd Nilssen, basso and Eloise O'Connell, soprano were heard.

Mr. Nilssen, mature and with wide musical experience, complimented Miss O'Connell, young, vivacious and new to the concert stage. She however showed none of the uneasiness sometimes displayed in complete control of her voice.

Nilssen's program included a group of early French numbers, followed by a Scandinavian group, including "The Swan" by Grieg, sung in Norwegian. Then in sharp contrast was the group of American Folk numbers for which he is well known on the concert stage. Probably best liked of this group was the appealing little song, "My Little Mohee" from North Carolina.

Miss O'Connell's solo group included "Rose Softly Blooming" by Spohr, "Vaghiissima Sambaiza" by Donaudy and "Musetta's Waltz Song" from Puccini's "La Boheme." She sang another Puccini number as an encore, the aria from his opera "Gianni Schicchi."

The final group was made up of three duets, "A Lovers' Duet" by Bonini, Mozart's "La Ci Darem Le Mano" from "Don Giovanni" followed by an encore, "Oh Lovely Night."

The program was very well received, and the singers certainly much applauded by an obviously charmed audience. Margaret Nofs Steinmetz, Portland pianist, ably played the accompaniments for both singers.

The next Crescendo club concert will be that of another former Oregonian, Lucile Cummings, one-time member of the Crescendo club and a graduate of Salem high school. Her concert is to be February 12.

U.S. Timber Plan Called Monopoly By Lumbermen

EUGENE, Jan. 22.—(AP)—Heated testimony, most of it against, kept the interior department's hearing going until mid-afternoon today as lumbermen gave their views on a 100-year sustained yield contract proposed for the Mohawk River unit of the Oregon and California reforestation lands.

Dale Fischer, leader of the group of lumber operators favoring the establishment of a sustained yield unit, took the stand at noon and denied that the granting of a contract to his Fischer Lumber Company of Marcola would constitute a monopoly as smaller scale operators have claimed at the hearings.

The hearings began Wednesday morning and were scheduled to adjourn the same day but the stream of witnesses kept the debate alive until nearly midnight and on again through most of today.

Road Board Officials Hurt

COOS BAY, Jan. 22.—(AP)—Two state highway commission engineers, driving to the legislative interim committee hearing on highways, were injured today in a truck - automobile collision.

Oscar Cutler, engineer in charge of county and city work, suffered a broken nose and face cuts. His assistant, John W. Catrall, was cut on the head. Both came to a hotel at Coos Bay after treatment.

Catrall was driving a state car on the coast highway when it struck the rear of a truck. The truck driver, Lyle Brooks, of Coos Bay, said a vehicle ahead of him stopped without signalling and forced him to stop suddenly.
