Stock Owners Have Meet

STAYTON — The annual meeting of the stockholders of the Stayton Canning company cooperative was held in Forester hall in Stayton Monday at 1:30 p.m. when Directors Al Phillips, Ed Gilbert, Clarence Gavette and Irvin Schumacher were re-elected to serve a two-year term.

In his report to the stockholders, Manager F. M. Smith reported that the cannery had received from the growers during the 1947 season 2,000,618 pounds of fruit and 15,082,261 pounds of vegetables. From the fresh fruit and vegetables received the cannery packed 269,065 cases of canned goods and quick froze 1,799,606 pounds of fruit and 3,481,003 pounds of vegetables. Sales for the year were \$1,882,037.90.

One hundred and five mem-

bers of the cooperative attended the meeting. The board will meet on Tuesday, January 27, to elect its officers for the coming year.

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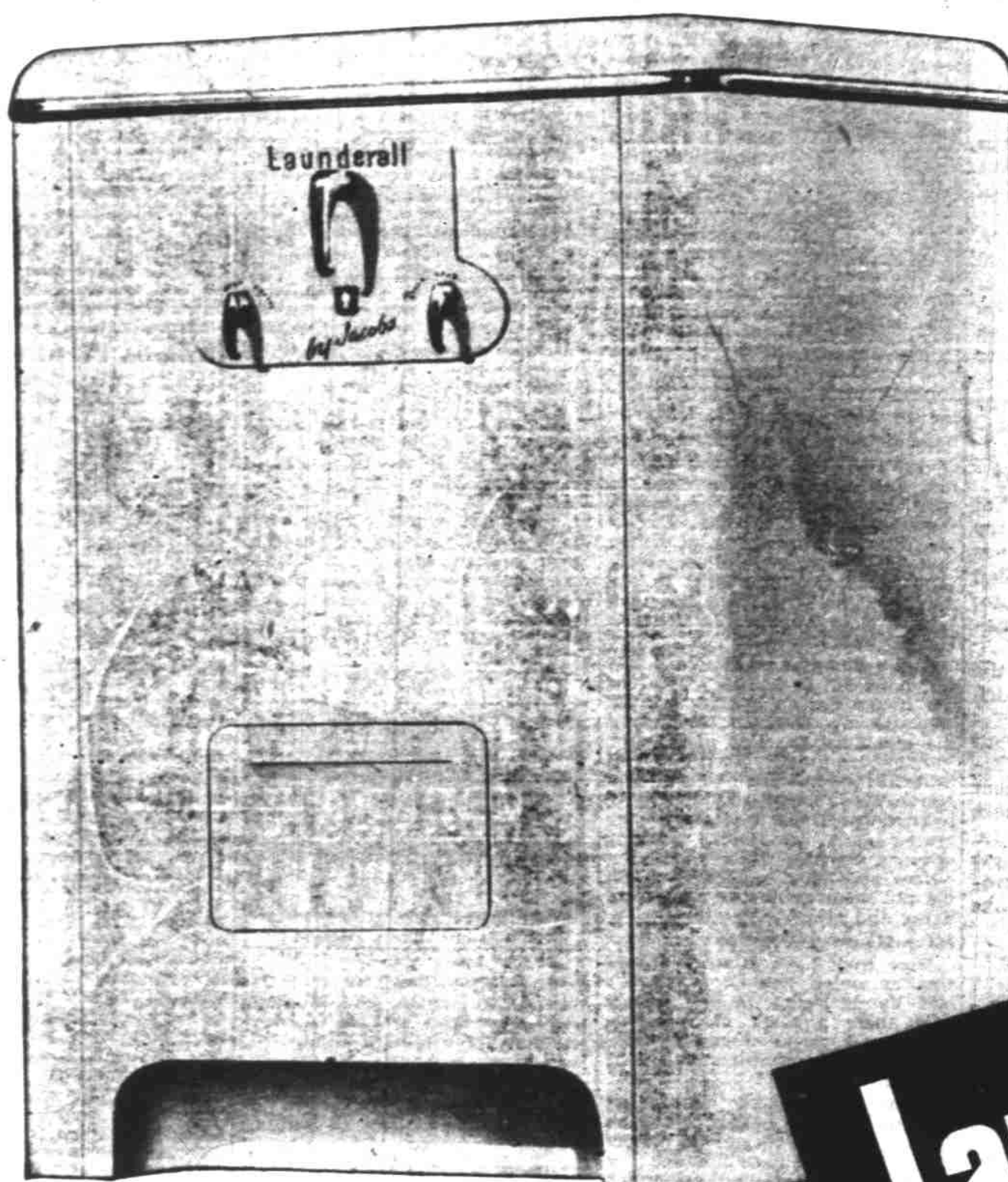
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
