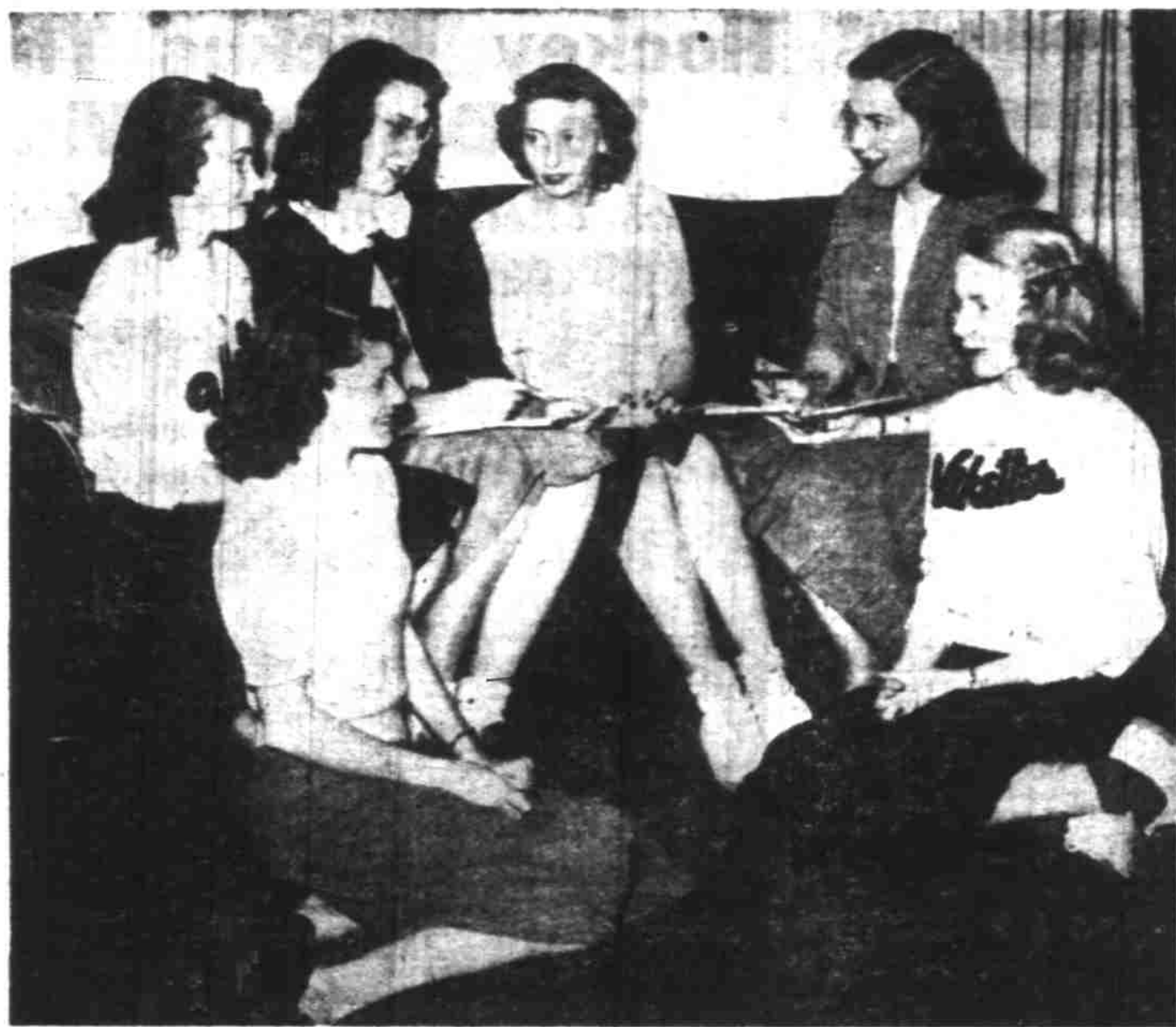

Aviation Cadet Examinations Set February 4

Deadline for examinations for aviation cadet pilot training is February 4, according to Lt. Col. H. E. Helliesen, commander of the Salem army and air force recruiting station in the post office building. The examinations will be given at Portland on February 4, 5 and 6.

Colonel Helliesen said 1948 quotas have been increased considerably and the first of three classes will begin March 1. Applicants must be from 20 to 26½ years of age and must have birth certificate, school transcript and three letters of recommendation when they report to the examinations. Additional information may be secured from the local recruiting office.

Prospects who pass mental tests will be flown from Portland to McChord field for physical examinations on February 6. The program applies also to men

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Owen Roberts, Forrestal Give UMT Backing

WASHINGTON, Jan. 26 - (AP) - Secretary of Defense Forrestal and former Supreme Court Justice Owen J. Roberts fired counter-blasts today at those who contend "push button warfare" makes large armies obsolete and universal military training unnecessary.

"If we accept the premise that under existing world conditions America must remain strong in order to assure world peace, no alternative exists to universal training," asserted Forrestal.

Roberts, who heads the national security committee, an organization backing UMT, said the argument by UMT opponents that mass armies are outmoded because of modern warfare "is a fraud which, if allowed to go unchallenged, may lead this country to disaster."

The American Legion, meanwhile, called upon the house rules committee to bring universal military training legislation to the house floor for debate and a vote.

Schools Place Emphasis on Rat Control

With the growing emphasis on Salem's rat control program, for which bait for individual use has been ordered, schools are joining in the project of learning about rats and their control.

School programs under way include classwork at Bush school, with surveys of homes as to rat problems and dramatization of "The Pied Piper of Hamlet" by the second graders.

An original play was broadcast by Olga Wikberg's sixth grade at Englewood school. Each room was asked to discuss rat control and note down rules. Prize for best suggestions was won by Mildred Randolph's fourth grade.

The story of rats was broadcast at Highland school by Lenore Headley, county health educator. McKinley plans an assembly by the third grade and a film on "Vandals of the Night" during the coming week. A film and social study group will consider the problem at Richmond school.
