Iraq Cabinet Resigns After Deadly Riots

BAGHDAD, Iraq, Jan. 27. —(AP)— The cabinet of Premier Salih Bey Al Jabur resigned tonight after 24 hours of rioting in which 70 persons were reported killed and more than 300 wounded.

The resignation signified collapse of Salih Bey's fight for ratification of the British-Iraq treaty of friendship and mutual military aid he signed in London 12 days ago.

Regent Abdul Illah announced the resignations in a broadcast to the nation, and appealed for restoration of order. Police exchanged fire with anti-treaty demonstrators. One report said a private plane machine gunned demonstrators crossing a bridge during the height of the rioting.

News that the treaty had been signed January 15 touched off riots in which 11 persons were killed. These finally were quieted by the regent who promised that no treaty would be ratified which did not guarantee Iraq's "natural aspirations."

The unrest bubbling under the surface erupted again last night after Salih Bey returned from England and announced he would remain in office and fight for treaty ratification.

The treaty would give Britain the right to send troops into Iraq in event of war or imminence of war. British rights to occupy two air fields in Iraq would be surrendered, but British planes could use the fields. The treaty called also for continued training and equipping of the Iraq army by the British.

Dollar Lines Ordered Sold

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 27. —(AP)— The Dollar Lines, operating buses interstate between San Francisco and Portland, Ore., and intrastate from Portland to Eugene, was purchased for \$26,000 at an open sale Monday by American Bus Lines, Inc.

The sale, ordered by the United States district court, is subject to confirmation by the U.S. district court and approval of the Interstate Commerce commission and the Oregon Public Utilities commissioner.

Sale of the Dollar lines was ordered after complaint and proceedings filed by the anti-trust division of the U.S. department of justice against Pacific Greyhound Lines, Greyhound company, Dollar Lines, Interstate Transit Lines, Inc., Interstate Transit Lines, Inc., and the Union Pacific Stages, Inc.

Rep. J. Parnell Thomas' Condition Unchanged

Bride in 'Kiss Murder' to Die; Man to Live

NEVADA CITY, Calif., Jan. 27. —(AP)— Joseph L. Hardy, 24, a native of North Kittery, Me., was convicted today of first degree murder for the July 30, "kiss of death" slaying of J. W. McLain. The Nevada county jury of six men and six women recommended life imprisonment.

Lois Hunt Hardy, his 20-year-old common law bride, recently was convicted of participation in the slaying of McLain, a veterans' administration employee of Burbank, Calif., and was sentenced to die in the state's gas chamber. She is awaiting the outcome of an automatic appeal to the state supreme court.

No mention was made in court of the difference in the verdicts. A different jury from the one which convicted Lois in the same courtroom last month returned today's verdict. The two defendants had been expected to face trial together but Hardy was at large, after escaping the local jail, when Lois' trial got under way.

Hardy, who will be sentenced at 10 a.m. next Tuesday by Superior Judge James Snell, appeared relieved but in the grip of deep emotion when the verdict was read. He shook hands cordially with his court-appointed attorney, Frank Finnegan, who served without compensation.

McLain picked up the hitch-hiking couple on their way west. The state accused the Hardys of luring the 48-year-old man to a secluded mountain meadow near Truckee on a promise of receiving Lois' favors.

Transplanted Teeth Grow In Children

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 27. —(AP)— A dramatic achievement in dentistry, the successful transplanting of wisdom teeth in the jaws of young patients to fill gaps caused by the loss of regular molars, was reported Monday by Dr. Harland Apfel, San Pedro, Calif., oral surgeon.

The value of this accomplishment, a long-sought goal in dental science, will require the test of time, but already it holds promise, Dr. Apfel said, of sparing many people from bridge work or dental plates in early life.

There is at present no hope of re-growing teeth in mature or elderly people who have lost their natural dentition, Dr. Apfel reported, but the idea offers a challenge to dentists to make the most of its possibilities, which may be greater than the limited first trials.

Reporting to the annual conference of University of California dental alumni, Dr. Apfel disclosed he had been transplanting tooth buds in young patients for two years.

At present, he said, six patients each have one solid newly-grown tooth with which they have been chewing for more than a year. Twenty-five others have transplanted teeth in various stages of growth, and there have been two failures.

A tooth bud is a match head sized germ or seed from which a tooth develops. Until it begins to grow it lies buried deeply in the jaw.

This is the first time on record that a tooth bud has been transplanted and grown successfully in actual dental practice.

Lyle Leighton To Start Trip

Off to a regional Boy Scout assignment in Kansas City, but expressing home to return to scouting in the Pacific coast area, Lyle Leighton will leave Salem by automobile with his family this morning after serving the past five years as Cascade council area's scout executive here. Leighton will start February 3 in his new post as one of four deputies supervising 38 Boy Scout councils in Missouri, Iowa, Kansas, Nebraska, Wyoming and Colorado. He has been succeeded here by Gordon Gilmore of Medford, due to begin duties February 14.

Scout and leader membership rose from 1,300 to 4,250 under Leighton's supervision here since 1943. Before coming here, Leighton was scout executive five years in Wenatchee, Wash., and earlier had been scout field man in Fargo, N.D., and a scoutmaster in Pipestone, Minn., his birthplace.

Mt. Angel Credit Union Dissolves by Unanimous Vote

MT. ANGEL. — Members of the Mt. Angel Federal Credit union recommended liquidation at the annual membership meeting at the Legion hall Monday night, January 26. The vote came following discussion which brought out that a trial of six and one-half years had proved the financial cooperative was not really needed nor wanted. Peter Gores, treasurer, informed members this action at once brought business to a standstill and there could be no more deposits, withdrawals nor loans.

Consensus of opinion was that it be best to liquidate while the credit union was in good standing and able to pay out in full value.

Since liquidation is a long and tedious process and the organization must remain intact to the end, the annual elections were held. Frank Hettwer and Frank Aman were re-elected to the board of directors. Sylvester Schmitt and Clarence Ebner tied for third place on the credit committee but a second vote gave the majority to Ebner. Theresa Dehler was re-elected to the supervisory committee.

Tony Traeger recommended a vote of thanks to all officers for their work but especially to Peter Gores who had served as treasurer for six and one-half years without compensation.

The directors' meeting which followed re-elected all officers: William Elen, president; Frank Hettwer, vice-president; Loretta Dehler, secretary; and Peter Gores, treasurer.

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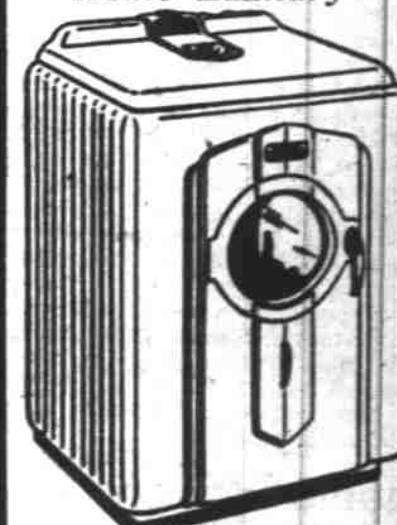
Toastmasters Pick Pitfalls
