Rowns States Christianity Hope of China

War-torn China can only hope to regain peace and prosperity through adoption of Christianity, an educational program and a change of viewpoint, Harold J. Rowns, national secretary for World Youth, Los Angeles, told members of Salem's three senior Hi-Y clubs at the YMCA Wednesday night in one of three local speeches.

Rounds, speaking from 15 years experience in the far east, told a capacity crowd that only one percent of the Chinese are now Christians and nearly all of the country's enormous population is illiterate.

The hope of China, he said, lies in the spread of the Christian religion and the expansion of education through Chinese now studying in American operated schools. Rowns recently returned from a trip through the far east and the Philippines.

In an earlier speech to the Rotary club, Rowns stressed, "If United States leaves China now, when there is trouble, it will leave a vacuum which would be dangerous."

While in a bad economic situation, the people are happy to be independent and are grateful to the United States which kept its promise to set them free from the invading Japanese and make them an independent nation, the speaker said.

Rowns also appeared for a radio broadcast in the afternoon over station KSLM.

Hi Y members, following Rowns' speech, made plans for the organization's annual "Sweetheart" dance which will be held in the gym of Salem high school February 14. The girl who will be named "Sweetheart" for the event will be named at next week's meeting, it was disclosed.

A fund of \$35.85 earned by Hi Y members shining shoes at school last week was turned over to the Y's world service treasury. Bob Seamster was "champ" of the shining bee, and turned in \$3.70 he earned polishing 37 pairs of shoes.

Art Association To Buy Bush Furnishings

The Salem Art association took steps to purchase the furnishings of the Sally Bush home at a meeting in the Salem public library Wednesday night.

Mrs. W. E. Anderson, acting president appointed James Walton chairman, Elizabeth Lord, Brenda Glass, Wallace Carson and Murray Wade as a nominating committee and David Dunway, Mrs. George Kay, Allan Carson and Mrs. Norman Huffman as a committee to re-write the by-laws.

With dues established at \$5, 25 persons joined the association at the meeting.

Otto K. Paulus, who holds power of attorney for the Salem Art Center association advised that the association remain a corporation. The last Monday in March was set as the day for the annual meeting. The association now has \$1,658 in the bank, according to the treasurer, Mrs. Clifford Taylor.

In reviewing what work has been done toward acquiring the Sally Bush home for use as art galleries David Dunway, state architect who headed the committee listed the following: Council agrees.

Dunway appeared before the city council requesting that the Sally Bush home be made available to the association. The council agreed to the request.

With Mrs. Norman Huffman, art instructor at Willamette university, and Mrs. Kathryn Lambert, antique dealer, Dunway made itemized appraisal and set \$12,551.50 as a fair price for furnishings which the association may want.

Stuart Bush, who owns the furnishings, agreed to use the appraisal as a basis for purchase and also to allow the association to make any reasonable terms of purchase.

Two representatives of the American Institute of Architects were brought here to make suggestions as to fireproofing the house.

Dunway last night recommended that the officers of the association enter into contract with Stuart Bush to purchase what furnishings they think advisable.

The Sally Bush home is considered a fine example of architecture of the 1890s.

Geology Club Hears Albany Lab Processes

Salem Geology society Wednesday night heard Dr. A. J. Kaufman, jr., chief of identification at the U. S. bureau of mines' Albany laboratory, describe his specialized work in differential thermal analysis to identify minerals found in hydrous materials of the Pacific northwest.

Intense heat breaks down the materials into parts which can be identified with the aid of spectroscopy or spectograph and other special equipment, the speaker said in his talk at Collins hall.

Several medical men joined the geology group for the meeting, having special interest in Kaufman's work in obtaining the new zirconium concentrate, for brain plates and other surgical uses, from zircon sands of Coos and Curry counties.

The society planned to conduct its annual election February 28 and to hold an installation banquet February 27. Meanwhile, new courses of instruction for the society will begin, under the direction of Prof. Herman Clark.

C. of C. to Hold Highway Talk

The Salem Chamber of Commerce Wednesday invited Marion and Polk county court members and representatives from all cities within the counties to attend a noon luncheon Monday, February 9, to discuss highway problems. James J. Walton, president, announced.

Purpose of the meeting will be to prepare material for a legislative highway interim committee hearing which will be held here February 16. Representatives and court members will be instructed to ready data so that highway and bridge problems may be presented to the best advantage at the hearing.

Rep. Ralph T. Moore, Coos Bay, is chairman of the interim committee.

Income Tax Forms Incorrectly Filed

Many persons are making federal income tax returns on the form received from the employer without filling out the reverse side, Paul Lynch, deputy collector of revenue in charge of the Salem office at the local postoffice, reports.

Many of these persons are expecting refunds which cannot be made until answers to the questions are filed, Lynch said.

Burned-Out Students Taken To Silverton

Thirty-five students of the Thomas school, which was destroyed by fire Tuesday afternoon, are placed in nearby Silverton's Eugene Field grade school, Mrs. Agnes Booth, Marion county superintendent of schools, said Wednesday.

Virginia Meek, principal of the Thomas school, and Mrs. Fred Hug, its only other teacher will teach in the Silverton school, Mrs. Booth said. Arrangements for the transfer were completed Wednesday by Mrs. Booth and Thomas and Silverton school authorities.

The Thomas school district board had recently approved tentative plans for building a new school house, Mrs. Booth reported. However, she indicated no new building would go up this school year.

One of Marion county's oldest schools, the Thomas school, located just north of Silverton on the Silverton-Marquam road, was a two-room structure. The fire, which broke out about 4:45 p. m. Tuesday, was of undetermined origin and fire fighters were hampered by lack of water.

Reds Hindered Crime Trials, Brand Asserts

Russia exerted every effort to completely obstruct the German war crimes trials at Nuernberg, Justice James T. Brand of the Oregon supreme court told members of the Salem Exchange club at the Salem hotel Wednesday.

Brand, who returned to Salem recently after serving on an international tribunal for a year, said it was necessary to try accused German war criminals on captured documentary evidence because the Russians seldom captured witnesses living in their zone.

Atrocities stories of German activities during the war were absolutely true, Brand asserted, and not concocted for propaganda purposes. "We found all the evidence we needed to convict the accused Germans in their own records, and it was true," Brand said.

Brand pictured the Russians as "bad hombres" who flatly refused to cooperate with American and British occupation forces.

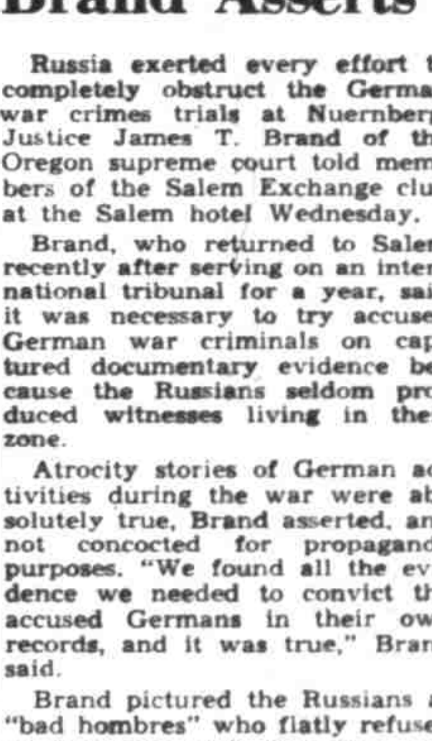

New Woman in Hayton Case

SEATTLE, Jan. 28 — (AP) — King county authorities today pressed a widening search for a Kansas City woman who, they said, disappeared after living for some time with Roscoe Lee Hayton, confessed slayer of two of his wives.

Detective Chief Adam Lyskowski of King county said the woman, a 28-year-old divorcee, and an older sister visited Hayton at his Manette auto court near Bremerton in Christmas, 1945, and stayed on into early January.

He said neighbors told him they saw Hayton packing the woman's luggage and that he explained she was leaving for Kansas City. He added, however, that no one has been found who saw her leave the auto court.

Hayton denied while under the influence of a truth serum Monday night that he was involved in any other slayings, officers said. He did admit, however, that he deeded a house to the Kansas City woman and gave her an engagement ring.
