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Rites Today For Klamath Basin Rancher

Services will be held at 10 a.m. today in St. Augustine's church, Merrill, for Robert W. Steele, 73, widely-known rancher of the Klamath basin, who died Sunday at a Klamath Falls hospital. Steele was born Oct. 28, 1874, in Toronto, Canada, and with his family came to Oregon when he was 9 years old, settling near Monmouth. He was married Oct. 26, 1898, at Corvallis to Helen Josephine Heckler of Albany. In 1905, the Steeles moved to Twin Falls, Idaho, where he was closely associated with agricultural development. He invented the Steele sage brush grubber widely used in clearing land.

In 1931 Mr. and Mrs. Steele went to the Klamath country and with their son, Joseph R. Steele, acquired large farm holdings. They resided at Merrill.

Mr. and Mrs. Steele would have celebrated their golden wedding anniversary in October.

Surviving are the widow, Helen J. Steele, Merrill; one son, Joseph R. Steele, Klamath Falls; a granddaughter, Dolores Helen; three sisters, Mrs. Isabella Hildebrand, San Francisco, Calif., and Mrs. Effie Andrews, Salem; and one brother, Donald G. Steele, Salem.

Final rites and vault entombment will be Friday at 2 p.m. at Lincoln Memorial park, Portland.

State Vet Loan Totals Given

Oregon's department of veterans affairs granted 457 loans to veterans last year, totaling \$1,597,725, or an average of \$3,496, the state office reported Wednesday.

Loans granted to help veterans buy homes and farms, since the department was created two years and three months ago, number 831 and total \$2,417,169. The department last year conducted 30,156 interviews with veterans in its Portland and Salem offices, of which 5,284 were with veterans seeking loan information, 4,468 about educational benefits, 3,055 about terminal leave bonds, 2,859 about GI insurance and 1,803 about apprenticeship under the GI job training program.

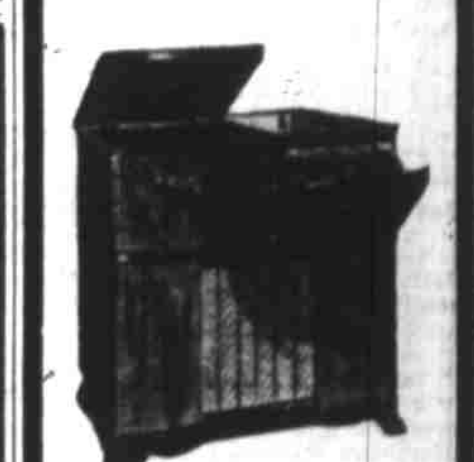

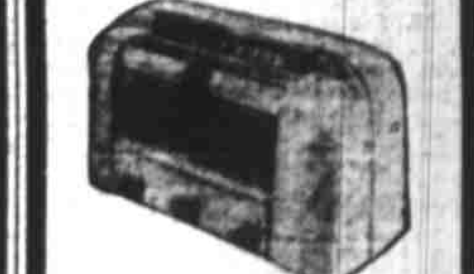
