

Select Rails, Industrials, Oil Lead Stocks

NEW YORK, Jan. 29 (AP)—Led by oils, selected rails and industrials, the stock market today negotiated another of its widest recoveries of the past month with dealing crossing the million-share level for the first time in a week.

Further buying by professionals on the idea that the recent drop to an average low since last June called for a substantial technical rebound provided most of the rising stimulus. The successful Gulf Oil financing and expanding demand for petroleum sparked stocks in this group. Another big batch of cheering earnings and dividends bolstered individual favorites.

Advances of 1 to 3 or more points were widely distributed at the close although a smattering of pivots failed to shake off small declines. Transfers of 1,060,000 shares compared with 860,000 the day before.

The Associated Press 60-stock composite was up .6 of a point at 63.7, best revival since Dec. 30. Of 1,014 issues registering, 600 rose, 196 fell and 218 were unchanged.

Bethlehem Steel finished up 1/4 at 34 3/4 and, after the close, directors voted a dividend of 60 cents on the 3-for-1 split stock. The old stock had received quarterly payments of \$1.50 a share. The board also reported net of \$1.21 a share for the December quarter against 96 cents in the September period and \$1.15 in the final 1946 quarter.

Grain Trading Breaks Even

CHICAGO, Jan. 29 (AP)—Trading in grains on the board of trade recout broke even today. Wheat was up as much as 2 cents a bushel, corn dropped as much as 1 1/2 cents, oats split between 1/4 higher and 1/4 lower.
Wheat took its strength, amounting to three cents at one time, from a mention in President Truman's special message to congress that wheat exports should reach 500,000,000 bushels from the 1947 crop if possible. The accepted figure previously in the trade had been 450,000,000 bushels.
Wheat closed 1/4 to two cents a bushel higher, May \$2.91 1/4, 2.92 1/4; corn was 1/4-1 1/4 lower, May \$2.58-2.58 1/4, and oats were 1/4 higher to 1/2 lower, May \$1.23 1/4. Soybeans were unchanged to eight cents lower, March \$4.08.
Weather news generally was favorable to the new crop of wheat in the southwest.

Vets Number 10% of Local Night School

About 10 per cent of the 375 persons enrolled in adult education courses given by Salem public school system are receiving state educational aid for veterans, George Porter, director of the adult education program, disclosed Thursday.
The number under state aid has increased during the past two years from six to 37, said Porter, and more applications are being processed. Veterans who meet certain qualifications, including previous residence in Oregon, are eligible to receive up to \$35 monthly for training.
The classes, running from 2 1/2 to 4 hours per week and held evenings at Salem high school, are changing in enrollment every week, with new admissions, according to Porter.

Freight Car Shortage Continuance Forecast
