Licensing of Milk Shippers On Increase

The state of Oregon has licensed 417 fluid milk shippers to January 20 of this year, in contrast to 36 shippers licensed on November 1, 1946, and 327 shippers licensed on Sept. 7, 1947, field representatives of the state department of agriculture's division of foods and dairies heard Thursday during their annual conference with headquarters officials. O. K. Beals, division chief, and Kenneth E. Carl, assistant chief in charge of dairy law enforcement, are presiding at the conference sessions which will be concluded today.

Reporting further on the licensing in the fluid milk field, Vergil N. Simmons who is the dairy specialist in charge of market milk, said that 66 producer-distributors had been licensed as of January 20. This is an increase of three since September and an increase of 38 since November, 1946. Twenty-six fluid plants are now licensed, compared with none in the two periods mentioned.

Milk Grading Reports

In another milk field, that of factory milk, the district men heard reports that 84,739 sediment tests were made in dairy manufacturing plants in Oregon in 1947. Of these tests, 5.68 per cent graded No. 1 milk, or what the department rates as "clean." Most of the milk fell in the No. 2 (fairly clean) class. A little more than 20 per cent of the sediment tests showed milk grading No. 3 (dirty), and 6.82 per cent was rejected milk.

Carl told the group that only about 25 per cent of the applicants for state licenses passed the last butter and cheesemakers tests. He added that "Too frequently the applicants for these examinations come unprepared, which leads us to believe that there is a greater need on the part of managements of plants to assist their employees in preparation for these examinations."

Hi-Y Clubs to 'Take Over' State Government Reins on April 2, 3

Salem Hi-Y clubs are to begin participation soon in Oregon's first "youth in government" program, which will be climaxed when boys and girls from over the state take over the state government on April 2 and 3. Two delegates from each club will soon be chosen to be legislators -- or perhaps governor.

The program will start, according to John Gardner, Salem YMCA boys' work secretary and Hi-Y director, with three district pre-legislative meetings next month. Portland's will be February 14, Salem's and the southern and eastern district's later.

At those sessions, the delegates will learn the procedures of legislative action and will elect higher officials. One district will choose a governor and a chaplain; another a senate president and a clerk of the house, and the third a speaker of the house and a clerk of the senate.

Following that, the delegates will lead their home clubs in discussion of governmental procedures, with at least four training meetings required. Each club is to draw up at least one bill.

At the April conference, nearly 100 members will occupy the legislative chambers in the state capitol and go through the work of democracy in action. Most will be from boys' Hi-Y chapters, with some from Tri-Hi-Y groups of girls sponsored by YMCAs.

Although the program has been operated in some other states, this is Oregon's inaugural year. Dr. U. G. Dubach of Lewis and Clark college heads the state YMCA committee guiding the work. It includes from Salem, State Sen. Douglas McKay; Tinkham Gilbert; Frank B. Bennett, superintendent of city schools; Rex Putnam, state superintendent of public instruction, and C. A. Kells, YM general secretary.

Ex-GIs Offered National Guard Commissions

A new policy for the direct appointment of second lieutenants to the national guard, increasing the number of former enlisted men who can qualify for commission, was announced by Oregon national guard officials Thursday in Salem.

Former enlisted men of all grades having a minimum of 6 months service in the United States army between Dec. 7, 1941, and June 30, 1947, are now eligible for direct appointment as second lieutenants provided they are graduates of an accredited college or university where no advanced reserve officers training course was given or, if it was given, their period in school before graduation was too short to permit them to complete the ROTC course, and provided they are at least 21 years old but have not passed their 28th birthday at the time of appointment in the guard.

Commissions as second lieutenants in the national guard are also open to advanced ROTC graduates without military experience.
