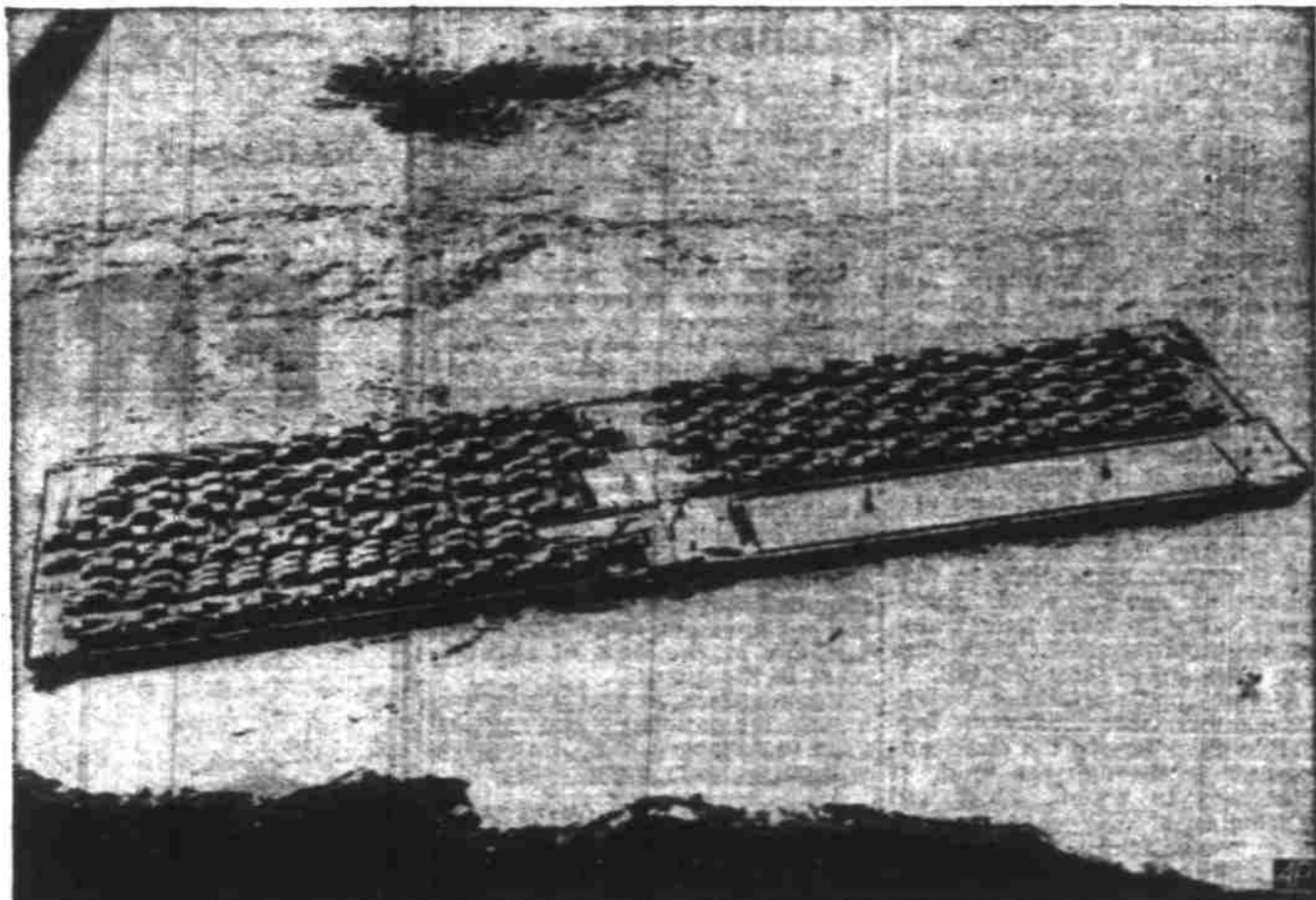
**Nora Ann Poole**

FRANKFURT, Germany, Jan. 28.—(AP)—Protests over food shortages threatened last night to result in strikes involving more than 4,000,000 German workers in the British-American zones.

The latest threat came from the hitherto quiet lower Saxony industrial area, where labor circles said 200,000 men might walk out next week.

**No Free Ham, But Meat War In Full Swing**

ST. HELENS, Ore., Jan. 29.—(AP) Free ham was off the list today but "hot bargains" were promised for the weekend as this north-west Oregon city's meat price war completed its fourth week with no slackening in sight.

Ernie Peterson, partner in the firm which opened Jan. 2 and claims to have forced down prices, said "We're making money." He listed today's prices as including pork roasts at 45 cents a pound, pork loin at 55, sirloin roasts and rump roasts at 49 and round steak at 59.

"We don't advertise bacon," he said. "That's at a normal price—63 cents to 76 cents with some up to 94 if you really want extra choice." Some other cuts are at the "normal" level, he said.

Jack Sappington, whose \$1 worth of ham free to a customer yesterday caused a big run from Portland, 25 miles away, said he'd just as soon stop the price reductions. Three pounds of hamburger for \$1 was today's chief price item, but he said there would be better ones this weekend.
