

War Memorial Group Dinner To Launch 8-Point Program

Promotion committees pushing the project of a civic auditorium for Salem will launch an eight-point program of action in reports to the Salem War Memorial associating meeting Thursday at 8 p.m. in the chamber of commerce.

Vice Adm. Thomas M. Gatch, Portland, naval hero of the recent war, is to be speaker on the program and will be introduced by State Treasurer Leslie M. Scott.

The men's promotion committee working in behalf of the auditorium, headed by Coburn Grabenhorst, is to outline plans for a concentrated newspaper publicity campaign, radio programs, a speakers' pool, and contact with all service and civic organizations. The four fields to be stressed by the women's promotion committee, of which Lena Belle Tartar is chairman, are posters, a slogan and essay contest, public speaking groups in the schools, and interest via cards and musical events, sponsors of which are among the groups seeking a civic auditorium.

All Salem residents interested in the objective of an auditorium and in hearing Admiral Gatch are invited to attend the Thursday meeting. Rex Kimmell, association president, said that also on the evening's program are reports from the building committee as to prospects on the type of building for the auditorium and from the location committee as to possible sites. The meeting is open to the public.

British Raise Price of Eggs

LONDON, Jan. 31—(AP)—The price of eggs in Britain was increased sharply today by a food ministry order.

The reason for the increase: To keep the cost of food subsidies within established limits. The retail price of best grade eggs was raised from one shilling, nine pence (38 cents) to three shillings (80 cents) a dozen.

The maximum price of second grade eggs was increased from one shilling, six pence (30 cents) to two shillings, six pence (50 cents).

The ministry quoted the price of eggs by the dozen but the average shopper is able to buy one egg a week on his ration book.

Soviet Budget Biggest Yet

MOSCOW, Jan. 31—(AP)—Russian Finance Minister A. G. Zverev proposed tonight to a joint session of the supreme soviet (parliament) the largest budget in the history of the Soviet Union.

With Prime Minister Stalin and Foreign Minister Molotov among his listeners, Zverev called for expenditures of 337,900,000,000 rubles and a revenue of 428,000,000,000 rubles in 1948.

The amounts would come roughly to \$77,380,000,000 in expenditures and \$95,600,000,000 in revenues.

Move Ends to Put Wallace on Oregon Ballot

PORTLAND, Jan. 31—(AP)—Oregon democrats supporting Henry A. Wallace for president announced tonight they would halt plans to place the third party candidate in the democratic presidential preferential primary in this state. Nick Chavoie, chairman of Oregon democrats for Wallace, said the withdrawal action was in accordance with the wishes of Wallace that nominating petitions not be filed.

The action was indicated earlier this week when Chavoie said the Oregon group had been advised Wallace considered it would be "dishonest" to place his name on the democratic party ballot.

AFL unions of Oregon were advised by the state federation's executive council today to "refrain from taking any action to encourage the candidacy of Henry Wallace for the presidency." A formal union announcement said that "in effect, the Wallace candidacy is a valuable asset to the candidacy of Senator Taft."

Money Leaves Circulation

WASHINGTON, Jan. 31—(AP)—The amount of money in the hands of the public has dropped by more than a billion dollars since Christmas, officials said today. They called it the biggest drop of the kind ever to occur in so short a period.

Government economists said it may indicate that rising costs of living are forcing people to take money from "hiding places"—such as cash drawers, mattresses, socks, etc.—for current spending needs.

Official reports show there was a \$125,000,000 fall during the week ended last Wednesday in the amount of "money in circulation." That left the total amount in the hands of the public \$28,086,000,000.

AFL Officials Form Political Association

PORTLAND, Jan. 31—(AP)—A campaign to sweep labor-backed candidates into office began in Oregon today with the formation of an "Oregon League for Political Education."

The league was set up, on a temporary basis, by the members of the State Federation of Labor executive board, acting as individuals rather than as AFL officials.

They plan a permanent organization which will be financed by \$1 memberships and by contributions, and which will work both in the primary and the general election. The executive board also ap-

proved an initiative measure to put state income tax exemptions back at their previous levels. Petitions are expected to be circulated later.

Salem was selected as the site of the federation's 1948 convention to begin June 21 and run for five days.

'Plane Crash' In Tennessee

MEMPHIS, Tenn., Jan. 31—(AP)—The Tennessee highway patrol station here said early tonight it had heard "a big plane had crashed" at Kentucky Point in West Tennessee and "is burning."

The patrol said it did not know whether the plane was commercial or military, but that cars were en route to the scene. Airlines and military sources reported all planes accounted for.

Fuel Priority In New York

NEW YORK, Jan. 31—(AP)—A voluntary priority list system of fuel oil deliveries was started here today and patrolmen were assigned by Mayor William O'Dwyer to ride all oil trucks to see that the program was carried out.

Under the plan, agreed to by the fuel oil companies at the mayor's request, shipments were halted to all non-essential users.

Deliveries will be made to dwellings, hospitals, institutions, public utilities, transportation and communication firms, food and food processing concerns, schools and health facilities.
