Honey Gives Sweetness, Flavor to Ice Cream Toppings, Say Growers

Hints to housewives: The American Honey institute offers some recipes for the use of their product, which we note, is available at the grocery stores now. While many persons tried honey as a general sugar substitute and found it to be too highly flavored, honey certainly has its place in the scheme of cooking.

Honey, while possessing considerable sweetening properties, is really more of a flavoring than a sweetener. Here then are some practical uses for honey, which becomes topping for ice cream.

HONEY SAUCE
4 tablespoons butter
1 tablespoon corn starch
4 tablespoons cocoa
1/2 cup honey
1/2 cup water
6 marshmallows
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon vanilla extract
Melt butter, add corn starch and cocoa. Blend well. Add honey and water. Cook over low heat until thick. Add marshmallows and salt. Cook just long enough to melt marshmallows. Add vanilla.

HONEY BUTTERSCOTCH SAUCE
1/2 cup brown sugar
1 teaspoon corn starch
1/2 cup water
