

National Highway Group Backs Federal Fund for State Roads

Legislation providing \$9,000,000 for construction of Oregon's forest highways has been approved by the American Association of Highway Officials and will be submitted to congress, R. H. Baldock, state highway engineer, said Wednesday.

Baldock, president of the group, made his statement upon his return from Washington, D. C., where he and other highway officials appeared before congressional committees seeking additional federal aid for highways throughout the country.

Baldock said that modernization of America's highway system will require a \$2,000,000,000 annual expenditure for the next 15 years. The association, he said, was insistent that congress appropriate \$500,000,000 annually of federal aid funds for highway construction without restriction on the number of years to carry out the program.

The group, Baldock explained, approved legislation which provides placement of forest highway funds in the federal aid appropriation bill. This legislation would empower the commissioner of public roads to contract with the state for the construction of such an arrangement would im-

mediately release about \$9,000,000 for Oregon's forest highways, Baldock said. The funds are badly needed, Baldock declared, because Oregon's post-war highway building program was made on the assumption that congress would make forest highway funds available.

Failure of congress to provide these funds has delayed reconstruction of many forest highways which are vitally important to business and recreation economy of the state, Baldock stated. Legislation before the senate would reduce federal aid funds from \$500,000,000 to \$300,000,000, makes no provision for forest highways and would place half of the urban federal funds on the interstate system, according to Baldock.

Salem on List For Airport Improvements

State and federal bureau reports Wednesday showed Salem on the list for airport improvement aid, but there was no change in the status of master plans for local airport development, said City Manager J. L. Franzen.

Long in the planning and red tape stages, the master plan calls for an \$80,000 improvement program of road paving, runway extension and improvement and related work. Available for the work, once final plans are approved by the federal government, are \$45,000 in federal aid funds and \$35,000 in city funds.

Franzen said Wednesday that formal application based on final plans and specifications for the improvements will be completed and submitted soon, in time to obtain the federal money before end of this fiscal year June 30.

The engineering aid listed Wednesday by the state aeronautics board for Salem is planning assistance which the state has given Salem in recent months.

Steady Trend In Stock Mart

NEW YORK, Feb. 11—(AP)—The stock market steadied today, virtually ignoring commodity weakness.

Although narrow declines continued to dominate the share list, many leading issues regained their balance and closed with gains ranging to around a point.

The Associated Press 60-stock composite was unchanged at 60.3, its lowest level since last May 27. Of 1,103 stocks registering, 286 were up on the day and 585 down.

The session was the fastest of the new year, 1,400,000 shares changing hands. The exchange closes tomorrow in observance of Lincoln's birthday.

Young People Needed to Build Church, New York Pastor Says

The need of the church to secure the ablest young people, the persons who can build a church, not just "carry it on," was asserted at a Wednesday session of the Oregon Council of Churches conference here by Dr. John Oliver Nelson of New York City, representing the Federal Council of Churches of Christ in America.

The secret of any organization is personnel, he said, and the church's must be good, for "our product, Jesus Christ, is still the best."

Amy Ogden Welcher of Hartford, Conn., at the laymen's banquet represented the United Council of Church Women and urged Oregon people to "bring the northwest spirit" to conferences in the east.

Cooperation stressed among Protestant churches and the importance of cooperative effort by Dr. J. Quinter Miller, also of the Federal Council. The effort must extend through all levels from local congregations to world organizations, he averred, with "yesterday the day of conferring on what should be done, today of conferring on how to do it and tomorrow the time to go forward and do it."

Protestants in the federal council, he said, have agreed on the directness of man's relationship to God, that the scriptures provide the decisive norm for life, the universal priesthood of all believers, stressing of religious liberty and that religion affords an enhanced appreciation of all.

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Soviet Tries to Link English, French, Nazis

MOSCOW, Feb. 11—(AP)—The Soviet Union charged tonight that Britain and France encouraged Adolf Hitler to make war on Russia and tried to isolate Russia from the rest of Europe.

Replying to the recent American publication of papers on Nazi-Soviet pre-war relations, the Soviets made public a number of documents which they said the red army captured from the Germans purporting to show:

1. Britain and France, to save their own skins, engineered the Munich agreement and other pacts to turn Hitler away from the west and toward Russia.

2. Britain and France concluded non-aggression pacts with Hitler "to unite Europe without Russia."

3. Britain gave assent to Hitler's Anschluss and annexation of Czechoslovakia and Danzig. Britain and France sat by without resistance when these annexations were accomplished.

4. Britain and France nurtured the Berlin-Rome axis and at one time even tried to join it.

5. Britain on one occasion doublecrossed France by failing to notify her when one secret German-British conference was held at the time of Munich.

Contrary to Monday night's declaration, the Soviets gave scant attention tonight to the United States.

His wife, who attempted suicide a short time later the same day, was in a "slightly improved" condition late Wednesday night, Young said. Eoff, officials said, was on parole from a life sentence at the Missouri state prison when charged with the assault.

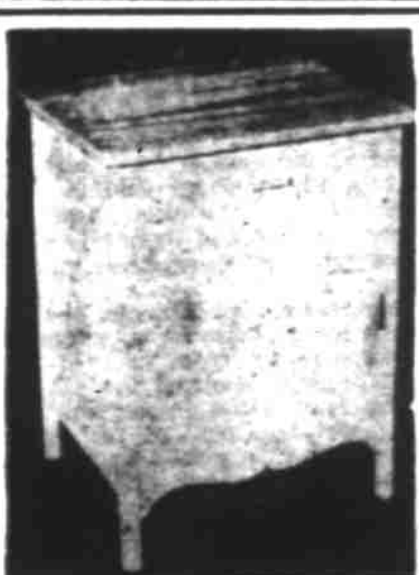
