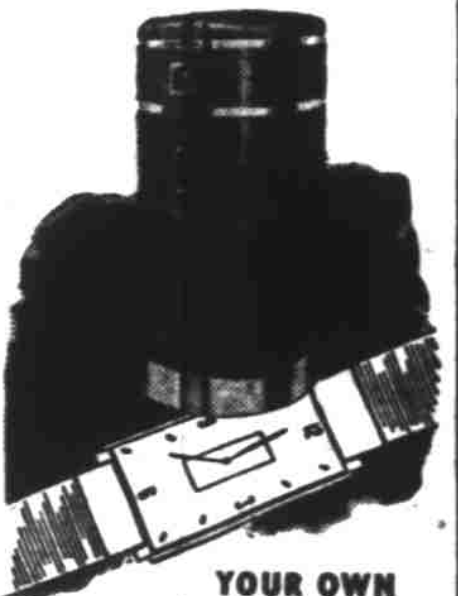
Record Program Proves Popular
