

Subsistence allowances for veterans taking on-the-job training in farming and trade apprenticeships in Oregon may be increased by 50 per cent if congress passes measure now in conference committee.

This announcement was made Tuesday by O. I. Paulson, head of the state vocation education division, with offices in Salem. Single trainees now receive \$75 a month and married enrollees \$90 a month.


