

Hi-Y Elects Representatives to Legislative Training Conclave

Salem's three senior Hi-Y chapters elected representatives to a legislative training conference to be held in Eugene Saturday at a joint meeting in the Salem YMCA Wednesday night, John Gardner, group adviser, announced.

Selected to represent Salem at the conference were Bob Seamer and Dick Fuhr of the Harrison Elliot chapter; Ken Adams and Bob Schuler of the Abel Gregg chapter and Bob Danielson and Marvin Black of the Arthur Cotton chapters.

The group will also decide which delegates will be senators and which representatives for the session.

The conference also will study various fields of legislation and receive instruction in parliamentary procedure.

After the conference, delegates will return home to draw up bills to be submitted during the model legislature and prepare for a pre-

legislative meeting in Salem on April 2 and 3.

Portland's Hi-Y groups have already elected top ranking state officials who will assume the offices of governor, secretary of state and treasurer's office during the session.

Included in a group of advisory officers who will help the youthful politicians are Rex Putnam, state superintendent of public instruction; Douglas McKay, state senator; Tinkham Gilbert, Salem merchant; C. A. Kells, Salem YMCA general secretary, and Frank E. Bennett, superintendent of Salem public schools.

E. B. MacNaughton, Portland banker, was re-elected president. It was announced at the meeting that enrollment in the plan had increased by 341 per cent in 1947, from 4,741 to 20,915 in Oregon.

Britain to Face Doctors' Strike

LONDON, Feb. 18.—(P)—The British Medical association disclosed today Britain's doctors had rejected the county's socialized medicine law in its present form but an official of the health ministry said the play would go into effect July 5 regardless of the vote.

The doctors voted 25,340 to 4,084 against the plan.

Physicians must decide individually whether or not to participate. A doctors' strike against the measure authorizing free medical service for every Briton was believed almost certain.

The plan, voted last year by parliament, involves government ownership of all hospitals and government operation of all health services.

Dairymen Told Caution Needed in Use of Tax Surplus

CORVALLIS, Feb. 18.—(P)—State Sen. Dean Walker, chairman of the joint ways and means committee of the last legislature, today called for caution in utilizing surplus income tax funds in speaking before the Oregon Dairy Manufacturers association.

Referring to Governor Hall's proposal that \$12,000,000 of such funds be used for higher education buildings, Walker suggested that no steps be taken until this year's income taxes are paid.

R. L. Trout, Portland, was elected president.

Dispatches received at the president's office said the base was established on Grahamland, which the Chileans call O'Higginsland after their famous soldier-patriot of Irish descent, Bernardo O'Higgins.

Hoss, Schuss Leave Radio Station KOCO

Dave Hoss and Al Schuss, program director and commercial manager respectively of station KOCO in Salem, were relieved of their duties Wednesday morning in an unexpected move by station owner Loring Schmidt.

Hoss, who lives at 1566 Court st., had been connected with the station since May 1, 1947, two months before the station began broadcasting. The move followed Schmidt's license with the federal communications commission last June.

Schuss is widely known in sports circles here and in Portland. Schuss joined KOCO's staff June 1 of last year, and since then has been in charge of the station's football and basketball in addition to his business duties.

"Schmidt, in a statement to The Statesman, said 'I have nothing to say and I can't see why they should say anything to say either.'"

Hoss said he had been replaced by John Morgan of Ohio. Both Hoss and Schuss said they planned to remain in Salem.

Hall Advocates Court Test of Fund Transfer

Even though Attorney General George Neuner hands down an opinion holding that surplus corporate excise tax revenues may be transferred to the general fund of the state without a vote of the people, such an opinion should be subjected to a friendly test in the courts before any of the surplus is used for governmental costs, Gov. John H. Hall declared Wednesday.

"It would be folly to obligate this money without a court decision," Governor Hall said. Surplus corporate excise tax revenues are now used to offset property taxes. Neuner is now writing an opinion, sought by the state board of control, which may be released later this week.

Marine Reserve Men Win Awards For Recruiting

Three enlisted members of Salem's marine corps reserve unit who brought in 26 enlistments during a recruiting campaign from January 7 to February 4 received awards in a meeting of the organization at the airport Wednesday night.

Pvt. George M. Cagney won the first prize of a table-model radio for 15 enlistments. An electric shaver went to Pfc. Clifford O. Hiemann who was responsible for eight enlistments and Sgt. Eddie J. Kelm won a gold watch band for three recruits signed up.

Wednesday's training session included instruction on the duties of cannoneers, computation of data from survey, interior guard duty and showing of a movie on inter-training.

One new recruit—Marvin Carl Harper of Aumsville—was inducted at the session.

The Russians alleged also in a 63-minute blast by Andrei A. Gromyko in the security council that the U. S., Britain, Belgium and France were supporting Holland because they have "colonies to which they cling."

Estimate for Independence Bridge Okehed

Marion county court approved Wednesday a state highway commission report which increased the estimated cost of building the proposed Willamette river bridge at Independence from the original \$640,000 to \$995,000.

The county's share of the bridge expenses was raised by \$65,000 from the original estimate of \$160,000. Folk county's share of the bridge construction was also increased by the same amount.

Expressing disappointment that the cost should be increased, the county court nevertheless said in a letter to R. H. Baldeck, state highway engineer, that it believed the bridge should be constructed because of its potential importance.
