

Warden Takes Young Slayer Into Household

CANON CITY, Colo., Feb. 26—(P)—Rough, tough Warden Roy Best said today he was going to raise Jimmy Melton, 12-year-old convicted killer, "like my own kid."

"I can't put that kid behind bars to be with the toughest thugs and bums in the state," Best declared. "I'm going to take him into my home, let him go to school."

"They sent Jimmy here for me to care for. The way I look at it, I can do it my own way. This is my way. I'm going to try it out."

Jimmy, who wears glasses and has a mild appearance, pleaded guilty yesterday at Las Animas to second degree murder in the killing of his sister Phyllis Marie Melton, 16, died, five bullets in her body, last Dec. 15 as she wrapped Christmas presents.

The boy, sentenced to serve not less than 12 years to life imprisonment, was brought to the state penitentiary here yesterday by a burly, armed deputy sheriff.

Best hopes that Jimmy, who said he shot his sister because he thought their father favored her, may go to school from when and if he does. Jimmy will ride a bicycle belonging to Bud West, the warden's 17-year-old younger child.

Mrs. Best took Jimmy on a shopping tour today. She even let him buy a four-colored cowboy shirt. Then Best took the boy on a tour of the prison to see what he is

missing but could be forced to take by mistake.

Four Killed in Bomber Crash

MERIDIAN, Tex., Feb. 26—(P)—The crash of a B-29 near here brought fiery death to four members of the crew but did not prevent 19 other bombers in the flight continuing a routine mission to the west coast and back.

Eight members of the 12-man crew, including Col. Alan D. Clark, 7th bombardment wing commander, who commanded the flight, bailed out of the plane. None of the survivors was seriously hurt. No northwest men were involved.

British Cruiser To Police Zone Near Honduras

LONDON, Feb. 26—(P)—The British cruiser Sheffield steamed through the Caribbean tonight with orders to block any attempt by "irresponsible elements" from Guatemala to cause trouble in British Honduras.

A foreign office spokesman said there are many opportunities for incidents along the 200-mile frontier dividing Guatemala from Britain's small Central American colony. He added that the 9,100-ton Sheffield was being sent to Belize, capital of British Honduras, to prevent trouble.

Recent events in the south Atlantic and Antarctic intensified a newspaper campaign in Guatemala for British Honduras, the foreign office spokesman said.

The Guatemalan press has launched a "virulent campaign" against Britain, the spokesman said.

(Guatemalan newspapers said the entire incident may have resulted from British misinterpretation of sarcastic remarks made during a hectic debate in Guatemala's congress over press freedom.

(The row in congress arose when the Guatemalan government temporarily suspended freedom of the press. The government acted because a newspaper suggested the Guatemalan army, instead of parading, do something useful such as taking over British Honduras.)

Garage Fire Starts in Car

Fire of undetermined origin completely destroyed the interior and top of a car parked in the SP Garage, 344 Ferry st., Thursday night and spread to the ceiling of the building, before firemen were summoned.

The car, owned by David Riggs, 575 Willow st., was being repaired in the garage, firemen said, and broke into flames about 8:30 p.m. A garage attendant summoned the fire department at 8:38 when he noticed smoke pouring from the shop. Little damage was done to the ceiling, but the interior of the auto and its paint were a complete loss.

Russ Ask Eastern Europe Given Say In German Plans

LONDON, Friday, Feb. 27—(P)—The Moscow radio said today Russia had sent notes to the major western powers urging that Czechoslovakia, Poland and Yugoslavia be given a voice in planning Germany's future.

The radio said the notes had gone to the United States, Great Britain and France.

The notes said the Soviet union concurred in a recent declaration at Prague in which Czechoslovakia, Poland and Yugoslavia charged the zonal setup in western Germany violated the Potsdam and Yalta decisions and was a threat to peace.

Blasts Demolish Portland Cabin

PORTLAND, Feb. 26—(P)—Two unexplained explosions in a north Portland cabin injured one person early today. Five other escaped.

Elmer Cavette, 14, was blown from his bed. His throat and shoulder were injured. Unhurt were Mrs. Mabel Ione Cavette, 46; her two daughters, Lavonne, 7, and Mrs. Norman Barber, 18; Barber 24, and a boarder, Patrick McCormick, 48.

Detective Henry Moore and Arthur Grieve of the sheriff's office said the explosions apparently were set off. They wrecked the three-room cabin and shattered windows 100 feet away.

Damage Suit To Cost GM \$1,236,000

CHICAGO, Feb. 26—(P)—A U. S. district court jury tonight awarded treble damages of \$1,236,000 to a former automobile dealer who had sued the General Motors corporation under the anti-trust laws.

The dealer, Fred Emich of Chicago, charged the corporation cancelled his dealership because he refused to use a General Motors automobile financing service. He claimed \$435,000 damages and had asked treble damages, under the law, of \$1,305,000.

The jury of 11 women and one man deliberated nearly 34 hours. The four-month civil trial before Judge Walter J. La Buy was the longest ever held in federal district court here.

Emich said after the verdict, "15,000 dealers were praying for me."

Emich operated Chevrolet agencies in suburban Oak Park and Chicago from 1932 to 1946. He charged General Motors revoked his franchise because he refused to use the General Motors acceptance corporation, a financing subsidiary.

Trask Bridge Open to Traffic

TILLAMOOK, Feb. 26—(P)—The flood-broken Trask river bridge was opened to traffic tonight, just one jump ahead of the stork.

Hurrying workmen replaced a temporary span, giving 2,500 residents of the Bayocean peninsula their first chance to drive to the mainland since last Sunday. Particularly pleased was a Whiskey Creek road family, where the young wife expects a baby next week.

Both an almost-built new concrete bridge and a temporary span lost their center sections in high water last Sunday. Ever since, the 2,500 peninsula residents have used boats or stayed home.

Liquor Board May Pay Welfare Bill

PORTLAND, Feb. 26—(P)—The state liquor control commission said today its revenue may be high enough to pay for Oregon's public welfare budget.

The auditor told the commission that \$7,220,000 (M) was paid into the public welfare fund during the first eight months of the two-year fiscal period. Only \$1,028,551 a month of revenue is needed for the next remaining 16 months to meet the welfare bill, he said, and current gross revenues are running about \$1,000,000 a month.

'Bill' to Address Alcoholics Anonymous

SEATTLE, Feb. 26—(P)—A co-founder of Alcoholics Anonymous, known simply as "Bill," will address a state meeting of the organization here Saturday and Sunday.

Members only will be admitted to the meeting.

Solons Ask States Given Beach Rights

WASHINGTON, Feb. 26—(P)—Representatives of six states asked congress today to give clear cut ownership of land under coastal waters to the states rather than the federal government.

All of them told a combined senate and house judiciary subcommittee that legislation is needed because of last year's decision by the supreme court that California does not own the land under the waters along its seacoast.

The committees are studying a bill to give the states clear title to the land and the natural resources in it. Similar legislation was passed by the last congress but vetoed by President Truman.

States represented were: Minnesota, Indiana, Oklahoma, Colorado, Florida and Massachusetts.

Tourist Crop Forecast Good

Another bumper tourist season this year was predicted by the Oregon state highway commission travel bureau Thursday, based on inquiries now being received from virtually all sections of the United States.

Bureau officials said these inquiries are arriving at the rate of approximately 5,000 a week with more than 4,000 received last Tuesday. Most of the writers indicate they are planning a trip to Oregon this year and ask information regarding scenic and recreational areas.

Several asked specific information relating to the Portland rose festival and Pendleton roundup.
