

Ex-Willamette Girl Exhibits Many Moods in 'Dream Girl'

With an engaging performance by a former Salem girl as the main attraction, "Dream Girl" provided a laugh-full evening for Salem play-goers at the high school auditorium last night. Terry Clemes, better remembered as Olive Clemes when she attended Willamette university in the class of 1941, was the star of the fast-moving comedy.

To meet the many whims and fancies of her real life, as well as her dreams, Miss Clemes, as Georgina Allerton, underwent a series of quick changes in mood and character—almost every time she disappeared from the stage, even momentarily. Her realistic performance was enthusiastically received by the large audience.

Many of the monologues were monotonous, but extremely enjoyable were the satirical and satirical situations in which this "girl with ideal" finds herself in

meeting life or escaping reality via her dreams.

Others of the traveling cast from the Civic Drama guild of New York also gave an excellent presentation of the Elmer Rice play, directed by Stanley Woolf.

Robert Herrman, as the egotistical newspaperman who incidentally wins the heroine, provides some of the best entertainment. Best at handling some highly "mugged" lines was Rita Burwell as Georgina's mother.

The scene changes, while smooth, left considerable wasted dark time between the many scenes.

The program in Salem high school auditorium, was sponsored by Salem 29-30 club to benefit funds of the local civic memorial auditorium. Two more plays in the series will be staged here in April and May.

Their comedy, with casts from the same guild, will be anticipated after last night's show.

Grain Price Changes Small

CHICAGO, Feb. 27-(AP)—Grains ended an erratic session with small price changes on the board of trade today.

Most of the day the market had a week underdone. At the opening losses in wheat extended to more than 4 cents. Early selling was based on rains in the southwest. But a late rally canceled most losses and left final prices mixed.

Short-covering, buying of wheat by flour mills and a demand for oats attributed to processing interests sparked the late advance. Wheat closed 1/4 lower to 1/2 higher, May \$2.36-2.36 1/4; corn was 1/4 lower to 1/4 higher, May \$2.16 1/4; oats were unchanged to 1/4 higher, May \$1.08 1/4-1.09 1/4, and soybeans were 1 to 2 cents lower, March \$3.48.

C. M. Brown — Funeral services were held February 26 at Gresham for the Rev. C. M. Brown, 78, who died in Portland a week ago. Born in Illinois, he came to the ministry in Inman Territory, and held other ministerial positions throughout the southwest. He attended theological school at Georgetown, Tex. He married Leona Montgomery in 1891. After moving to Oregon they lived at Toledo, and he was county judge of Lincoln county for four years. They then moved to Salem to send their children to school. In 1916 they went to Alaska where he engaged in the carpenter trade employed by the government. He mined in Idaho for a time. A law student, he was admitted to the bar. In 1934 they came to Monmouth, but moved to Gresham during the war. Mrs. Brown and a daughter, Mrs. Mabel Holman, and son, Marvin J. Brown, Los Angeles, survive.

Mrs. Easter Ann Moore — Funeral services were held February 24 at Eugene for Mrs. Easter Ann Moore, 88, who died Sunday at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Ray Allen in Eugene. She had been ill, briefly, from heart trouble. Born in Illinois, she spent her early life in the midwest where she married A. A. Moore. In 1903 they came by wagon from Nebraska to Merrill, Ore. In 1911 they bought a 10-acre farm tract a half mile from Monmouth and built a new home, residing here until 1923. Mr. Moore died in 1925. Since then Mrs. Moore had spent her time with her daughters in Eugene and her son and family in Portland.

PETITION For the Organization of the Four Corners County Drainage District TO THE HONORABLE COURT OF THE STATE OF OREGON, FOR THE COUNTY OF MARION.

Come now your petitioners, persons shown by the records of Marion County to be the owners of more than 20% of the acreage in a contiguous body of swamp, wet or overflowed land, waters from which contribute to the swamp, wet or overflowed condition of such lands or any other lands situated in said Marion County, and herewith present to your Honorable Body their petition that they may form a drainage district, pursuant to Chapter 289 Oregon Laws 1947, for the purpose of having such lands reclaimed and protected by drainage or otherwise from the effects of water, for agricultural purposes, the same being the lands in which they respectfully represent.

1. The name proposed for the District is Four Corners County Drainage District.

2. The boundaries of said district are as follows:

"Beginning at a point where the center line of Market Road No. 27 (known as East State Street) intersects the West line of lot 9 of City View as shown in Town Plat records for Marion County, Oregon, thence North along the West line of lot 9, 10 and 11 in said subdivision, to the South line of the Southern Pacific Company right-of-way thence East along said right-of-way line to the East line of Elma Avenue; thence South along said East line of Elma Avenue; thence West along the South line of Beck Avenue; thence West along the South line of Beck Avenue to the West line of Market Road No. 27, (also known as Turner Road); thence North along the Westerly line of said Turner Road to the South line of Mable Avenue; thence West along the South line of said Mable Avenue to the West line of said street and extension thereof to the Center line of Market Road No. 27; thence East State Street; thence East along said Center line to the place of beginning."

3. The estimated acreage within said boundaries is 148 acres, and said land is wholly in Marion County, Oregon.

4. All or substantially all of the lands within said boundaries will be benefitted.

5. The lands within the boundaries set forth constitute contiguous body of swamp, wet or overflowed land, waters from which contribute to the swamp, wet or overflowed condition of such lands and all of said lands will be benefitted by the construction of drainage, irrigation, flood or other water control works.
