Under Pressure

Cookers Speed Up Food Preparation; Help Cut Down on Fuel, Grocery Bills

These months of cold weather and high gas rates are a trial for the housewife who lives within an unextendable budget. This woman must find ways of cutting costs of both fuel and food, and many have found the answer in the pressure cooker.

Long cooking meats, which are always less expensive, may be made actually economical now that cooking time also can be reduced. Our household has seen many an oxtail, lamb shank, beef stew and other long cooking meat get into the pressure cooker and come out shortly, cooked and ready to serve.

The cooker, too, is a boon to the working housewife who must prepare food quickly, yet wants to set a good table. In the morning she may throw the meat in the cooker and add liquid as directed in the cooker's booklet. She then cooks the meat for a portion of the time required, while she gets ready for work.

In the evening the family cook adds vegetables if desired and completes the cooking in a few minutes.

Such foods as potatoes, rice or beans can be prepared in short order in the cooker and will cook while the remainder of the meal is being prepared. Some women even use two pressure cookers, others use one for two different foods. This is done by either cooking one food after the other is done, or by using the dividers now available and which keep the foods separate from one another.

The cooker has another practical use, and that's for making soup. Vegetables or meats can be broken down very quickly when cooked under pressure. The flavor's retained too.
