Russ Composer's Music Heard

Excerpts from Khachaturian's Gayne ballet suite and from Gershwin's "Rhapsody in Blue" will be heard in a concert of recordings showing the influence of folk music on contemporary compositions. The informal concert, from 3 to 4 Sunday afternoon at the YWCA, will be the third in a series sponsored by the YWCA young adult committee with Mrs. A. A. Schramm as chairman.

Khachaturian is one of the young Russian composers recently reprimanded by Pravda and other communist sources for allowing "decadent" influence to show in their music. His Gayne suite, with its spirited dances, shows clearly the use of folk themes adapted to modern tempo.

Gershwin's classic shows how American folk music - jazz - has widened the concept of "classical" composition.

The concert will be presented by Marguerite Wright, using records from her private collection. Members of the audience Sunday will be given an opportunity to request favorite recordings for presentation in future concerts, and persons with unusual or rare recordings who wish to share them with the music-loving public may contact Mrs. Schramm for arrangements.

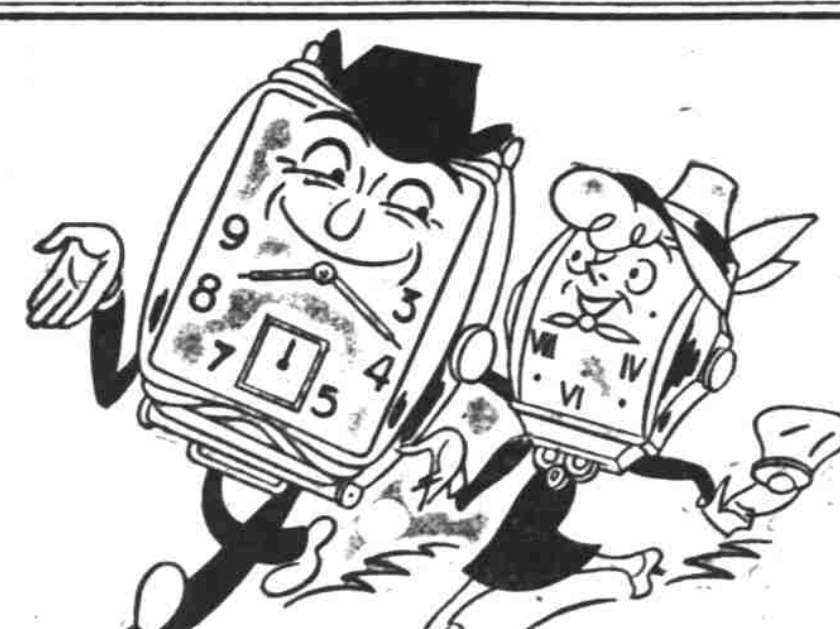
