

Prof. Brandt Sees Danger Point In Importing California Cattle

While not objecting to help feed as many cattle in Oregon as feasible, some danger of importing disease into the state was expressed Friday by Prof. P. M. Brandt, head of division of animal husbandry, Oregon State college, in reference to the increased movement of cattle from drought-stricken California to Oregon ranges and pastures.

"Every precaution must be taken to ward off diseases and we should not overtax our own feed resources," Professor Brandt said. M. E. Nickerson, division of animal husbandry, state department of agriculture, also interviewed Friday, said that the "cattle-out" move resulting from California's brown-out and other drought measures, so far is more talk than reality. Entry permits have been issued for movement of 2,500 cattle into Jefferson county, he said, and requests have been received for permits covering about 2,500 more, including 1,000 head of dairy heifers, into Jackson county, and a few dairy head to Coos county.

stock may be coming into the state without benefit of an official permit, with the resultant danger of bringing in disease. They point out the impossibility of policing the entire state border, and urged that all who wish to bring in cattle for feeding should use the utmost precaution to obtain only completely disease free cattle.

Inquiries Made
Some Marion and Linn county ranchers have made inquiries into regulations at the state department of agriculture, stating they had extra pasture which might be profitably used to feed some of the cheap cattle from the drought area. However, Mr. Nickerson stated, he knew of none which had come into the Salem area. Closest shipment reported was the 24 Hereford cows and 22 calves received at North Portland Thursday from near Paso Robles, Calif., and which will be fed by Eddie Meng, Multnomah county feeder, on a near-by farm. The condition of the cattle was said to be "very poor."

Before permits are issued, the state department requires clinical health certificates and tuberculosis and Bang's disease tests for each animal, although special permits waiving the Bang's tests are issued for movement into areas where no control program is in operation, such as Malheur county. Livestock coming from areas near the Mexican border are placed in quarantine for 30 days before final entry permits are granted.

Tests Difficult
Tests in the disease-free counties such as Marion, require time and trouble for few veterinarians doing these are equipped to handle large numbers of wild range cattle. The tests can be made, however, in approximately 72 hours, Mr. Nickerson said.

Comet Seen By Residents Of Salem Area

Thursday night's comet didn't pass Salem unnoticed.
Mrs. S. E. Hardcastle of 379 S. 19th st. said she had a "wonderful view" of the object shortly after 9 p.m. while she was in a car on Wallace road out of West Salem. She described it as a star-shaped, blue-white object "with what looked like a short tail." It seemed to be moving somewhat slowly toward the north.

Tom Pomeroy, proprietor of Salem Model Craft, said he was watching the lights of an airplane about 9:10 p.m. when he saw the comet and its blue tail streak past above the plane.

Nurses at the state tuberculosis hospital southeast of Salem said the comet, often changing color shades, appeared to drop over the hill and into Salem. Four nurses reported they had been watching a "dull-looking star" for three nights previous and that on Thursday night it suddenly "dropped from the sky" as the comet.

P. L. Pratt, 910 S. 13th st., said the comet looked to be about the "size of a dollar" and made a greenish-blue streak across the sky from southwest to northeast.

Building Trade Workers Win 17½ Cent Raise

PORTLAND, March 5-(P)—An arbitration award here today gave four building trades unions a 17½-cent hourly wage increase.
For AFL carpenters in Portland it raised the wage level from \$1.75 to \$1.92½. For AFL laborers and teamsters in Portland the level went from \$1.35 to \$1.52½. For AFL linemen in Oregon and five southwestern Washington counties, including the Longview area, the pay increased from \$1.75 to \$1.92½.

The arbitration board also approved a formula providing for \$5 a day subsistence pay for all out-of-town work.

The unions and employers agreed last month to submit the issues to arbitration.

Union officials said the award for carpenters, laborers and teamsters did not apply to upstate locals. They are expected to negotiate their own agreements.

Mother-in-Law Wins \$35,000 In Radio Prizes

HOLLYWOOD, March 5-(P)—A grandmother who lives in a three-room house on a New Mexico Indian reservation qualified today as the nation's happiest mother-in-law.

To Mrs. Edgar Parrett of Shiprock, N. M., went \$35,000 worth of prizes from the "Queen for a Day" radio program.

Mrs. Parrett, 56, took the news calmly in the little one-telephone town north of Gallup, N. M.

"I was hoping," she said, "but I really didn't expect to win."

Her name was one of 3,000,000 submitted by listeners throughout the country.

The prizes — which Mutual Network officials said surpassed anything ever air — given, even by the "Walking Man" — took three announcers four minutes to read.

They included a house full of electric and gas — operated appliances topped by a home-frezer stuffed with food; an automobile and trailer; a complete wardrobe, with a \$100 Persian lamb coat; a diamond ring and watch; and a two — week trip to New York City, Vermont mountains and Bermuda.

The winning card was drawn from a fish bowl by Actress Billie Burke to climax a contest beginning February 2.

The 24 cards left in the bowl were those previously drawn as daily winners in the preliminaries leading up to the grand finale.

Nothing was required of entrants except their names — no box top, no endorsements, no slogans. It wasn't even necessary to tell, in 25 words or less, "I like my mother-in-law because..."

All you had to be was a mother-in-law.

German Pilot Claims Hitler Escaped Alive
MUNICH, Germany, March 5-(P)—The U. S. army declined to express an opinion today on a former German pilot's claim that Adolf Hitler escaped alive from Germany.

One high official said the story "sounds fantastic." But official comment was withheld until the pilot and his story have been carefully checked.

Arthur Friedrich Rene von Angeltot-Mackensen told the story to U. S. officers in nearby Wolfratshausen yesterday. He was questioned again today by army agents.

The pilot said in a signed statement that Hitler and Eva Braun flew to Denmark in a Junkers-52 transport plane as the war ended. The last he saw of them was when they took off from Denmark by plane toward Spain, Mackensen said.

Army officers began questioning Mackensen yesterday after receiving a tip, they said, from his jilted girlfriend, Ruth Lindauer, who claims he does not believe a word of his story.

The tall, 26-year-old German claims to have been an SS officer in Hitler's personal bodyguard.

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Jewish Guns Kill 30 Arabs

JERUSALEM, March 5-(P)—The Jewish militia Haaganah said today that Jewish fighters killed 30 Arabs and wounded many others in a four-hour battle last night on the plains of Sharon.

The battle developed in the coastal region between Tel Aviv and Haifa when the Jews repulsed Arab attacks on the settlement of Magdief, Haaganah's communiqué issued in Tel Aviv said.

Four Jews were wounded, Haaganah reported. The Jewish force returned safely to its base.

Arab sources in Tel Aviv said Arab commando forces are concentrated in hill towns in the Sharon district, ready to strike when the order is given.
