Lebanon Recreation Area Planned Adjacent to City

LEBANON — Santiam Wranglers since incorporation February 26 have shaped plans for development of a recreational area west of the city. Approximately 86 acres was acquired to provide a varied list of recreational facilities.
According to Wranglers, soft and hard baseball grounds will be prepared, facilities to aid 4-H exhibits, livestock exhibitions, Strawberry fair activities and football if there is a demand for it.
Glenn Huston was elected president, Earl Schackman, vice-president; R. C. Reeves, treasurer, and Layton Loftin secretary. Les Hobbin, Sweet Home; O. M. Stevenson, C. H. Walter, Roy Fitzwater, Clay Nichols, W. E. Bohle and Cash Bryant, all of Lebanon, complete the corporation's directory board.
A figure "6" dirt track, affording a 440-yard straight-o-way leading into a half-mile oval, will surround a central playing

field. Wranglers say their plans have culminated after four years' designing and that by the end of March, a surveyor's layout for the track will be staked.
First construction will see the track and grandstand ready before Strawberry Festival days in early June, if weather permits, the group's officers assert. The Wranglers are capitalized at \$50,000.
