PCL's Move Against Major League Threat

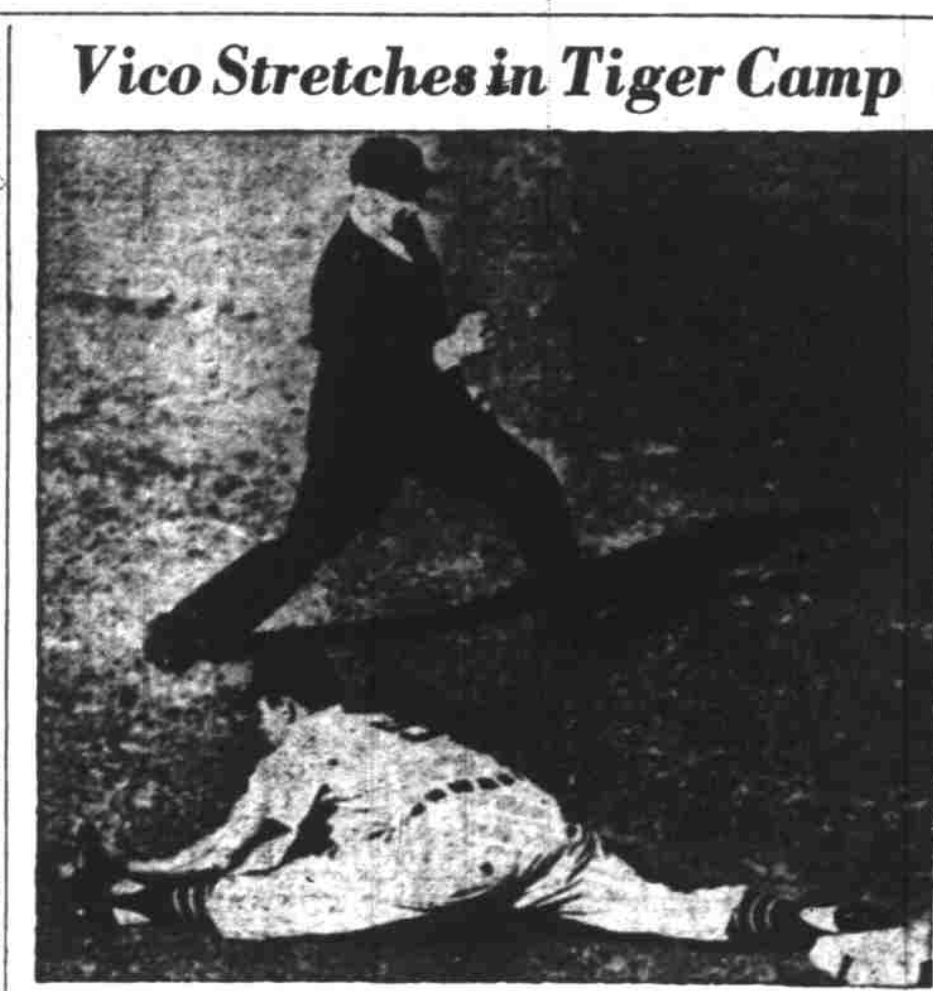

Nichols Held to 11; Second Tilt Tonight

BERKELEY, Calif., March 12 (P)—The University of California Bears went into the lead of the Pacific Coast conference basketball championship playoff tonight by defeating the University of Washington Huskies 64 to 51 in the first game of the best of three series before an overflow crowd of 8,000. The second tilt is set for tomorrow night.

Washington, trailing three points at halftime, 30-27, went into the lead two minutes after the second half opened on field goals by Bob Jorgensen and Jack Nichols.

Andy Wolfe put the Bears out in front again, 35-34, with a field goal, but Washington came back on field goals by Sammy White and Nichols to take the lead that they held mid-way through the second half.

Wolfe and George Walker dropped in field goals to put the Bears out in front 47-44. From that point on, California switched to a fast-breaking game and literally ran the legs off the Huskies.

The Bears' speed carried them through the Huskies' defense for point after point. California scoring 17 points while holding the Huskies to seven.

Jack Nichols, Washington's high-scoring center, was held to 11 points.

Andy Wolfe was high point man with 16 tallies. He was followed by Chuck Hanger and George Walker of California with 15 and 13 respectively.

Sammy White also scored 11 points for the Huskies.

The Bears played without the services of their first string center, Jim Smith, who was sidelined with an injured leg. California moved forward Chuck Hanger to the center position and gave him the job of guarding Jack Nichols, northern division high scorer.

ARLINGTON, Ore., March 12 (P)—Monmouth pulled the biggest upset of the Oregon Class B high school basketball tournament tonight to move into the finals against Jacksonville.

Coach Bud Gronquist's Wolverines from Monmouth came up with a tight defense that downed the highly favored Union Bobcats, 34-33.

Jacksonville's tall team won as expected from Umapine, 51-45, to set the stage for tomorrow night's championship game. Union and Umapine will play for third place.

The Monmouth-Union game was deadlocked nine times and with three minutes to go it was tied up, 32-32. Frank Baum put Union ahead with a free throw, but with just 1:45 minutes remaining Neal Sawtelle of Monmouth took a pass from out of bounds, dribbled the length of the floor and scored the winning goal.

Jacksonville led from the start in the other semi-final contest. The margin was only 29-27 at the half and 44-41 with three minutes to go, but the victors pulled away thereafter.

Drain from southern Oregon and Oakridge from Lane county won their way to the finals of the consolation bracket with afternoon victories. Drain's Warriors beat off a late Garibaldi rally to win, 40-37. Oakridge outlasted a similar comeback by Madras to win, 39-36.

Track Aces Eye Marks

CHICAGO, March 12—(P)—American indoor records in the shotput and 70-yard low and high hurdles may topple Saturday as 700 collegians covet in the 17th Illinois Tech relay.

Most illustrious of the athletes entered from 51 universities and colleges are Baldwin-Wallace's super timber-skimmer, Harrison Dillard, and Michigan's great shotputter, Chuck Fonville, both record-crackers almost every time they go to the post.

Dillard, defending in the college division 70 low and high hurdles, could be pushed into bettering the 97.8 American low-stick mark he shares with Ohio State's Bob Wright. The great Negro hurdler also may menace the .08.5 American high barrier standard held by Wright and Northwest's Bill Porter.

Porter, whose Coach Frank Hill thinks he may yet turn in an .08.2 or .08.3 performance, will defend his 70 high hurdle crown in the university division in potentially the greatest mid-western race of the season.

Equipped with only three lettermen, but an urge to make this one of the best seasons Willamette has had in track Coach Jerry Lillie is this week working with his first Bearcat cinder shod. A number of previous prep standouts are enrolled in school, and many will turn out next week to help WU start the march toward the top in the sport among the smaller colleges of the northwest.

Last year Willamette placed sixth in the Northwest conference meet and emerged victorious in only one triangular meet. Lack of proper facilities is now a handicap, but there are a number of outstanding freshmen in school, and Lillie feels that the success or failure of this year's team falls upon the shoulders of these yearlings.
