New Swegle Garden Club Is Organized

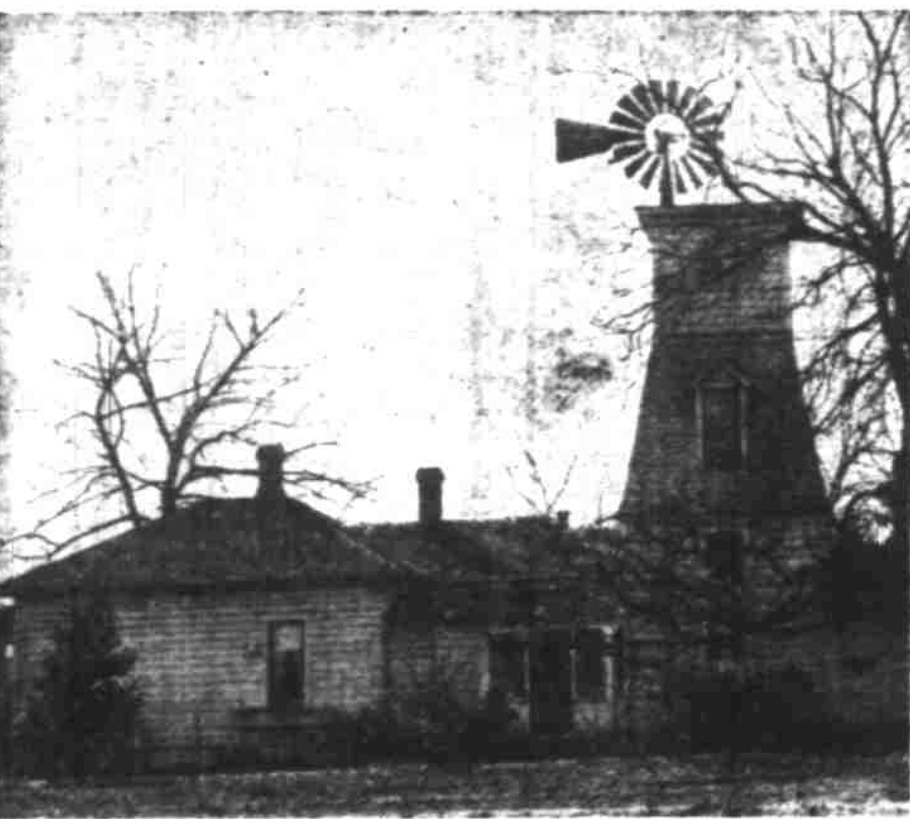

Old Windmill on Salem House



A house with its attached windmill was a common sight in the early days of Salem and many may still be seen throughout the Oregon countryside, but the home of Mrs. H. P. Chase, 871 N. 17th st., is perhaps the only one in Salem with the windmill tower still intact. The 40-foot well and 1,000-gallon tank are still used to supply Mrs. Chase with fresh water for her lawn and garden, although an electric pump has supplanted the old windmill pump built with the house in 1891. Electricity Replaces Wind as Power for Pioneer Well Pump

If some of northern California's drought blows up Salem way, or this summer's sun causes a rationing of water for lawn sprinkling, Mrs. H. P. Chase of 871 N. 17th st. will think little of it. Her own well, pump and water tank located in the 57-year-old windmill tower of her house will keep her from worrying about a water shortage.

Passersby can see the old house with its typical early-day windmill tower located on the corner of Center and North 17th streets, much the same as it was when Mrs. Chase and her husband built their house in 1891. At that time there were wheat fields next to their lots and only two or three other houses. Salem's growth was already indicated, however, because the ground was marked off into lots, plots and blocks by real estate agents of that time.

The mill is still usable, but after more than 50 years work without major breakdown, according to Mrs. Chase, an electric motor was substituted four years ago for wind power.

The 1,000-gallon tank provides all the water for household use as well as for the lawn and gardens, so while Mrs. Chase probably isn't expecting Salem to have a prolonged dry period, she won't be worried if there is.

The tower was built to be handsome as well as practical with a large room at the base and a generous second-story store room. At
