

City to Ask Change in Spur Track to Reduce Hazards; Council Votes Street Work

The city of Salem will request Spokane, Portland and Seattle railroad to change location of its spur track near the junction of Liberty and High streets, just north of downtown Salem, as an improvement of traffic conditions in that vicinity.

This was decided Monday night when the city council heard City Manager J. L. Franzen's recommendation to that effect at a meeting in Salem Chamber of Commerce.

Franzen said the railroad wants a second spur to serve the new Larmer warehouse on North Liberty near Belmont street and by arranging to use some private property probably could add a second track, at the same time, to replace the present spur in a location less hazardous to motor vehicle traffic which is expected to increase considerably when Broadway street is opened farther north.

The council referred to the city a request by Salem Lodge of Perfection for permit to erect a Scottish Rite fraternal building at Summer and Gaines streets on a lot in class I residential zone.

Remonstrance was made by Willard Taylor of Salem Boat House and Attorney Paul R. Hendricks (representing the two other businesses leasing city riverfront property) against recent action to raise their lease fees. They pointed out that private business has developed the riverfront property, a 500-foot strip near the foot of Chemeketa street, and informally "pooled" what used to be a hobby in return for leases at \$1 a year. But, they added, fees of \$30 to \$50 a month under the new city policy would be excessive in that it would restrict further development of the property.

City Manager J. L. Franzen was instructed to re-study the lessees' ability to pay.

Bonds Ordered Sold
In other city council action Monday: An \$82,500 Bancroft act bond issue for street improvements was ordered sold to Blyth & Co. of Portland, low among three bidders with an interest proposal which will aggregate \$9,713.

Bids were initiated, without final action, to set a 12-foot setback line for the west side of West Nob Hill street between Superior and Commercial to 4th streets, 22nd from Trade to Mill streets, Oak street from Winter street west to the alley and Lane place from John street to the west end of Lane.

Public hearing was called for 7:30 p.m. Monday, May 3, at Salem Chamber of Commerce on proposal to vacate the alley in the city block at Court and Capitol streets where a state office building is to be built.

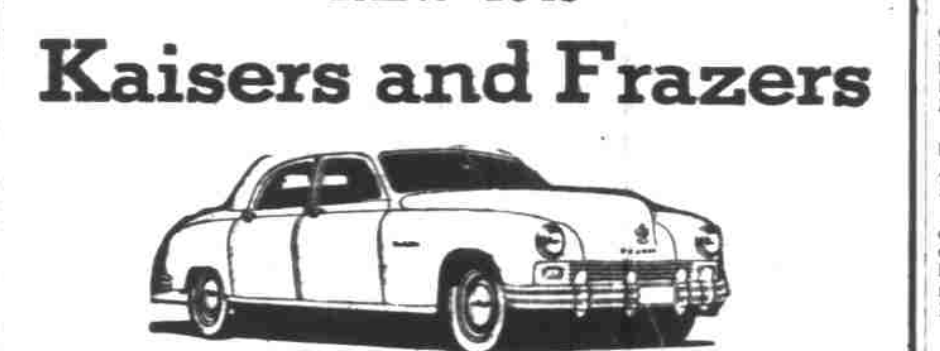

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Irish Setter of Tacoma Takes Top Honors

A handsome eight-year-old Irish Setter of Tacoma, Wash., took top honors, "best of show," as the 12th annual Salem dog show closed late Sunday night after two full days of judging more than 400 dogs of 51 breeds and varieties.

The overall winner at the Salem armory events was the American and Canadian champion, Knightscrest Polymount Dan, winner of five previous "best of show" trophies in the past three years. He was shown in the ring by his owner, Johnny Long, proprietor of Polymount Kennels, Tacoma, Long and his wife, who are professional dog handlers, showed 14 other dogs in the competition ring Saturday and Sunday.

In group eliminations preceding the final judging, the Irish setter had qualified for the finals by winning the sporting dog group in which 12 breeds and variety winners competed. Runner-up (second) in this large group had been a Salem black cocker spaniel, Willett's Mr. Chips, owned by J. H. Willett who was chairman of arrangements for the Salem Lions club, which sponsored the show in conjunction with the Dog Fanciers' Association of Oregon.

The five other group winners, besides the Irish setter, reaching the final judging, were Hound-dachshund, Bucknam's Merry Andrew, owned by Shorp Steele, San Francisco, working dog—doberman pinscher, Astrid V. Stufthub, owned by Grace E. Hamilton, Portland, terrier—Scottish terrier, Ramill Black Jane, Carnation Farms Kennels, Carnation, Wash., non-sporting—crow chow, Yangtze's Debutante, S. E. Luckey, Seattle, toy—Pomeranian, Artistic Suntoy, Mrs. Elva U. Cohen, Vancouver, Wash., and Cat Washington of Seattle also received a trophy cut for showing the only brace, a pair of Welsh terriers.

Although relatively few of the 400 dogs shown were from Salem or the mid-valley area, several prize ribbons went to Salem, Oregon City and Lebanon dogs. Willett spaniels won three "best of variety" ribbons in the black, solid color and parti-color varieties. L. D. Ringland's bulldog of Salem, Zorro Louisa Gung-no, took winners dog and best of winners ribbons. Mrs. B. E. Kenneley of Oregon City showed the best of breed and the winners bitch and best of opposite sex in borzoi dogs. Albert E. Wilson of Lebanon showed the winners bitch and best of opposite sex English setter.

Although stormy weather reduced the crowds at the dog show Sunday, paid admissions for the two days totaled about 2,000.
