

State Gives West Salem \$15,000 For Street Paving, Council Told

WEST SALEM, March 25—West Salem will receive \$15,000 of state highway commission funds to pave a 40-foot road on Seventh street between Patterson avenue and Wallace road, Mayor Walter Musgrave informed the city council here tonight.

Release of the allotment for the project was made at a meeting of the League of Oregon Cities in Albany earlier this week, Musgrave said. The money is provided from a fund for cities of less than 5,000 population who have shown a reasonable increase in population and industrial development.

Under the plan owners of abutting property along the street will furnish money to install curbs. Musgrave and Councilman Earl Burk, street committee chairman, said that the property owners are willing to provide the curbs. The council directed Burk to notify the highway commission that the 40-foot paving was acceptable to the city. It was estimated the curbs will cost \$3,500.

which will probably be submitted for council action within the next two weeks. The new budget year will start July 1.

The council also signed an agreement with the Southern Pacific company for easement of a 10-foot strip of land along the right-of-way. The action was recommended by City Attorney Elmer Cook.

Councilmen present besides Burk were Dr. A. F. Goffrier, Donald Kuhn, Chester Douglas and Ray Stevens. W. C. Heise was absent because of illness.

Vote of Confidence

In other action in the special session called by Musgrave, the group gave a vote of confidence to its city employees and instructed the budget board to insert in the new budget an allotment to hire an additional full-time employee to understudy and assist Ward Barrett, city foreman.

Councilmen said an additional employee is needed to install new water meters and to replace Barrett or any other city employee who might be off the job. The new meters are now being installed only in new residences being connected with city water. It was indicated, however, that enough meters would begin to arrive later in the year to permit workmen to start installations in older homes.

Request Attention to Budget

Mayor Musgrave requested that the councilmen devote their attentions to the 1948-49 budget.

Advertising Agency Drops Tobacco Firm

NEW YORK, March 25 (AP)—A young executive made history in the advertising world today by tossing out the lucrative American Tobacco company account.

Emerson Foote, 41, president of Foote, Cone and Belding, gave no specific reasons for resigning the account that had gross billings of \$11,000,000,000 to \$12,000,000,000 a year, believed the largest account ever voluntarily relinquished by an agency.

Foote said his action was based on "differences of opinion; not differences of personality." He explained: "If an agency can't do the kind of advertising it believes in, it ought to stop taking commissions."

It was the second time within a week that differences over the advertising of Lucky Strike, Pall Mall and British - made Kenistas cigarettes resulted in the severance of an American tobacco connection.

Last Friday another young executive, George Washington Hill, Jr., 39, whose grandfather and father headed American Tobacco for many years, resigned as an officer and director of the company. Hill was vice president in charge of advertising. He said he had responsibility without authority.

Solon Urges Prosecution of Export Firms

WASHINGTON, March 25 (AP)—Senator Maybank (D-SC) today proposed prosecution of U.S. firms and individuals involved in shipping war materials to Russia.

President Truman commented meanwhile that Russia is a friendly country.

Mr. Truman told a news conference that most of the shipments now causing angry voices in congress were ordered as far back as two years ago.

He added that the commerce department is working on the matter. Rep. Shafer (R-Mich.) said that Secretary of Commerce Harman assured the group today that the department is clamping down on shipments.

Maybank raised his cry for prosecution both in a letter to Attorney General Clark and before a senate armed forces committee. He wrote:

"To my utter amazement I have read of the shipments of airplane motors and other materials to Russia which may eventually be used against us."

"I believe it is your duty as attorney general to start proceedings immediately against the firms mentioned and all responsible."

Senator Bridges (R-NH) said shipment of goods to Russia that would be useful in war at a time like this is "disgraceful and almost treasonable."

Solon Urges Underground Against Reds

WASHINGTON, March 25 (AP)—A plan to back secret opposition to communism in Soviet-dominated countries drew the attention of senators today.

It was presented by Senator Bridges (R-NH) carrying forward his idea that an underground offers an effective means of preventing war.

Bridges told colleagues that he expected to discuss the proposal with Defense Secretary Forrestal and Secretary of State Marshall. He wants their opinions on how to best foster such a program.

Addressing the senate yesterday, Bridges suggested that the United States would benefit by keeping in touch with foes of communism in countries controlled by Russia. He urged that America "encourage the underground behind the iron curtain."

"We should attempt in every way possible," he said, "to maintain contact between free Americans and those within conquered areas who still have freedom in their hearts."

Bridges, chairman of the senate appropriations committee, was en route to New Hampshire tonight.

POST OFFICE APPROVED
WASHINGTON, March 25 (AP)—A bill providing \$300,000 for a new post office site in Portland, was signed by President Truman today.

Failure to Kill Diseased Cattle Causes Dispute

PORTLAND, March 25 (AP)—A group of Tillamook dairymen and the state department of agriculture were battling today over whether cattle which show signs of Bang's disease should be killed or not.

Bang's disease (brucellosis) causes undulant fever in humans who drink raw milk of infected cows. A state law provides control measures against "reactor cattle" — animals which react positively to Bang's disease tests.

State Director of Agriculture E. L. Peterson asked the Tillamook county district attorney to take legal action against seven Tillamook dairymen who have been cited for failure to dispose of reactor cattle in their herds. Peterson said the law requires such cattle to be killed.

The district attorney, Warren A. McMinnimee, declared the state Bang's disease law is not so vague it is difficult to take legal action under it, and asked the state attorney general for an opinion.

McMinnimee said later, however, he would file complaints against the men in "a week or 10 days."

The seven dairymen contend that slaughtering cattle is not an effective control against the disease, and want a program of vaccination established instead.

"We are willing to let them test our cattle and brand our reactors," said Ben Miller, president of a new association formed to fight the present regulations. "But if they insist upon killing the cattle, we'll take it to court and test the constitutionality of the law."

Midget Radio Sets Shown by Bureau Chief

NEW YORK, March 25 (AP)—The Institute of Radio Engineers got a look at some ultra-midget radio transmitters—one so tiny it fits into a lipstick container.

They were shown by Dr. Cleodo Brunetti of the national bureau of standards, Washington.

Dr. Brunetti would dip into a pocket and out would come a tiny radio sending or receiving set developed by the bureau.

One was a wrist watch transmitter. With the strap removed, it fitted handily into an ordinary—not king size—cigarette package.

Another was a duplicate of the "walkie-talkie" set presented by the bureau to President Truman last Christmas. It's about the size of a long pocket cigarette case and looks very much like one until the tiny telescope antenna is pulled up for sending. It will transmit only, but Dr. Brunetti said it could be designed to receive as well with little or no increase in size.

The tiny sets were built with printed circuits and sub-miniature parts designed by the bureau and now being produced commercially by several manufacturers. Dr. Brunetti said the midget sets were built to demonstrate what could be done in that field and the results made available to manufacturers for use as they see fit.

Thought of Wife Kept C-47 Pilot On Agonizing Road to Rescue

VANCOUVER, Wash., March 25 (AP)—Pfc. John M. Belmonte, 17, of East Boston, Mass., today told of the agonizing sequel to an airplane crash Sunday, and credited Major John B. Harding with pulling him through.

He and Harding, the pilot from Portland, Ore., are the only survivors of ten aboard an army C-47 that crashed in the snow-covered cascade range 20 miles north of here.

Despite second degree burns, a broken leg and frozen feet, Harding kept moving and got them to safety two days after the crash, Belmonte said.

Still in a hospital with feet that were frozen, Belmonte said in his first interview since rescue Tuesday that seven survived the crash but that the major was the only one able to walk.

Found Unnased Shack
He went one way, the major another in a search for help. He stumbled through snow, woods and streams and finally found an unused shack. He spent Sunday night there. Meanwhile the major broke his leg in deep snow and crawled back to the wreckage.

Belmonte the next day stumbled onto the wreckage again. Only three were alive. The major was the only one who could move, so Harding joined Belmonte in the search for rescuers. The other two died before help arrived.

Harding traveled on his "hands, knees and elbows" the 2½ miles to the shack. They spent Monday night there, and Belmonte said the major kept him alive by sheltering him in his arms against the cold.

The next day Belmonte said, "I just couldn't make my legs work. I wanted to, but I couldn't."

Called Him 'Yellow'
The major finally called me yellow and that worked... then we heard a motor. At first we thought it was a helicopter, but yelled and someone answered. The major broke down and cried then, but if it wasn't for the major, I wouldn't be here."

Harding called Belmonte "a very brave guy for 17," but dismissed the rest of it with "when you want to live bad enough, you can do anything. You know my wife is going to have a baby in about two months. She's the one I was worried about — how she'd take it."

Mammoth Sprinkling System Recommended

WASHINGTON, March 25 (AP)—A \$2,300,000 sprinkling system to irrigate 4,330 acres of orchards and truck gardens near The Dalles, Ore., was recommended today by Secretary of the Interior Krug.

It would be the first time that sprinkling—the method used by city householders—would be tried on a federal reclamation area too steep for irrigation ditches.
